His Jan. 15 program for the Franklin Forum sponsored by the Friends of the Franklin Library, is "Songs That Built a Nation," depicting phases of the westward movement in American history, thus "correlating history with folk song."

Tickets will be sold at the door of the Franklin Community church, where the program will be held.
