West B'field Get \$21,176 In U. S. Grant

WEST BLOOMFIELD—A federal grant of funds to West Bloomfield Township this week has assured financing of a master plan for the township.

Township officials were notified that the township will receive \$21,176 from the Housing and Home Financing government agency toward the cost of a master plan. The township had applied for the grant under a plan where the federal government pays three-quarters of the cost for urban planning, with the township paying for the remaining quarter.

THE MASTER PLAN is a two-year project. Federal funds granted this week were for the federal government's share toward cost of the first 18 months of developing the plan.

Villican-Leman will serve as planning consultants for West Bloomfield in working out the master plan. Total cost for the plan is estimated at approximately \$34,600.
