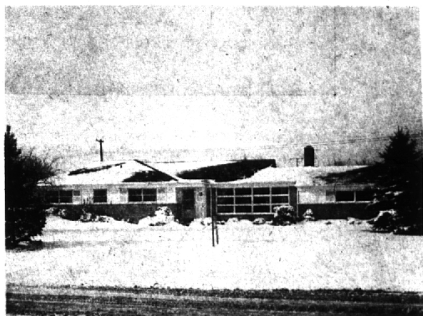

BRIDGE in BIRMINGHAM

In order to gain the top results from a hand of bridge, we must take into consideration all information that is given us. The opponents bids will often aid us in knowing where key cards are. Sometimes, like in today's hand, a bad bid will confuse us.

Ira Benjamin of the Birmingham area was able to untangle the unusual bid of East and still determine where the key cards were. This is probably why I notice his name among the winners in Birmingham tournaments so often.

North and South vulnerable. North is dealer.

NORTH
♠ Q 10
♥ K 7
♦ A J 8 6 4
♣ Q J 10 8

EAST
♠ K 7 5 4
♥ 8 6 4 2
♦ 5
♣ A 9 5 3

SOUTH (Ira Benjamin)
♠ A 9 2
♥ A Q J 9 3

The bidding:
North East South West
1 ♠ 1 ♣ 1 ♠ 1 ♣
pass pass 4 NT pass
6 NT all pass

Opening lead: 10 ♣
The double by East cannot be recommended, but he did do his best to interfere with the big hands of North and South. It may be this attempt to fool South that caused him to reach this six no trump contract.

West decided to open the top of his weakest major and Ira won this trick in dummy with the king of hearts. He next knocked out the ace of clubs, which took three rounds, and East exited with another heart.

At this point, Ira could see eleven tricks if East had the king of spades and West the king of diamonds, but to make his contract, he must find the jack of spades in the West hand, so he played for this break.

THE QUEEN OF DIAMONDS was led, covered by West and won in the dummy. Ira now cashed his remaining club and then led the queen of spades. This was covered by East and won in the closed hand and won in the closed hand.

On the play of the last heart by South, West must either discard the spade jack or leave the diamonds unprotected, for a perfect squeeze.

the orchestra give three concerts each year, but thought the goal impossible at present because of the limited rehearsal time—three hours each week.

THE ORCHESTRA'S biggest problem is rehearsing only once a week, according to Brown.

"We have been working only in a very small way so there have been no financial problems as yet," he said.

"As the group gets better," said Brown, "we intend to make it a symphonic orchestra." Up until now we have just done arrangements of things.

The program for the upcoming concerts includes an overture by Whitney, "Concerto for Strings" by Aronson, "Miniature Symphony" by Scarmolin, "Cordova" by Albeniz, "Toccata" by Freasobaldi, two movements of the Bruch violin concerto in G minor and a suite of Romanian dances.

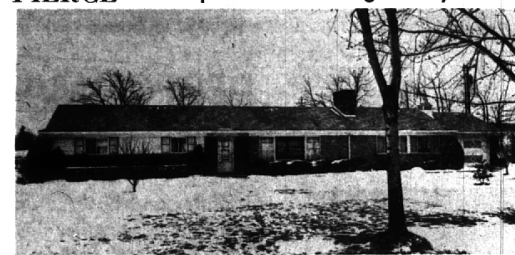
