the board of directors is just now formulating for expansion (including an auditorium) of the Community House.

If these plans materialize, the City will have to "put parking in that block in Shain Park (Merrill) to Townsend, Henrietta to Bates."

This, Burgum emphasized, would provide parking for the Community House, the municipal building and other buildings in that locale.

"The commission," Burgum stated further, "is committed to the widening of Oakland from Woodward east, to developing an alternate street program downtown to take part of the load off Maple."

"I personally feel that we should, sometime, remove parking from the north side of Maple in the afternoon, during peak traffic."

BURGUM, MAYOR pro tem the last two years, stands to be elected mayor this year, providing he wins the commission race in April.

Burgum, 45, has been a commissioner for five years. He served previously on the plan board for seven years.

He is married and has three children, one enrolled at Barnum, one at Seaholm and one at DePauw University in Greensville, Ind.

Perring Succeeds Joseph Dodge as Bank Executive

Raymond T. Perring of 545 Yarbrough, Bloomfield Hills, has been named to succeed Joseph M. Dodge as chairman and chief executive officer of the Detroit Bank & Trust Co.

Dodge, 72, who retired Tuesday, will continue as a director and member of the executive and trust committees and as honorary chairman of the board.

Perring, 57, will complete 38 years of service with the bank Wednesday. He was named assistant vice president in 1933, vice president in 1941, executive vice president in 1951 and president in 1963.

ported Sigler during the campaign but now is not entirely satisfied with the governor's attitude toward labor. So Gus has written an article critical of Sigler and intends to have it published next week in the CIO News. However, before publication of this criticism Gus wants the governor to know about it and offers to resign from the commission if Sigler requests such action.

"You go back and tell Gus Scholle that Sigler is appreciative of every help he gave during the campaign, and for his services on the commission. Kim Sigler believes in the right of every citizen to 'speak his own mind'—he also believes that this right extends to every person associated with him in state government."

"So, on behalf of the governor, you go back and tell Gus Scholle that he should publish his critical article . . . and also tell Gus to continue serving on the commission . . . for his contribution to its operation is Sigler's idea of free and open citizen-participation in trying to meet government's problems."

The chap smiled and left. Gus continued on the commission and, during the 1948 election campaign, went over to the side of "Soapy" Williams (whom Sigler had appointed to the Michigan Liquor commission) and helped in the defeat of Kim Sigler.

So, you see, Gov. Romney's publicized attitude toward appointing August Scholle to a state board or commission has a precedent.

BURGUM SPEAKS highly of his fellow commissioners and "the way they tackle problems, such as the payment of Birmingham's share in the Twelve Town Drain," which saved the taxpayers several thousand dollars.

"The fact that they (the commissioners) have been able to maintain or lower the tax rate the last four or five years and still providing quality services speaks well for the commission, he felt.

Having a fresh viewpoint, he said, helps in solving problems.

But this is one of the reasons he serves on the commission—"to try to solve problems in an economical way in the best interest of the community as a whole."
