Arraignment In Southfield

SOUTHFIELD—A Detroit man will be arraigned Friday at 9:30 a.m. in Southfield Municipal Court on charges of negligent homicide in the traffic death of a Flint woman.

Bernard Wilson, 21, will be arraigned before Judge Clarence Reid, Jr. The victim, Mrs. Dorothy Brundage, 35, died Jan. 5 in William Beaumont Hospital.

The accident occurred on New Year's Day at the intersection of Telegraph and Northwestern Highways.

POLICE SAID that the car driven by Mrs. Brundage's husband, Delbert, headed south on Telegraph, was slowing or had stopped for a red light at the intersection when Wilson's car struck it from the rear. The Brundage car was knocked into the intersection where it collided with a station wagon, which in turn was thrown into the path of another car which struck it, police said.

Brundage and two passengers in her car were also injured in the crash.

Oakland Dems Plan To Triple Membership

Tripling the membership of the Oakland County Democratic Committee was the goal set by the membership committee at its membership drive kickoff meeting in Birmingham Friday.

"With each member of the county membership committee acting as chairman of a committee in his area and working closely with the precinct delegates to sign up all known Democrats, we hope to increase our dues-paying membership in the county from the present 613 members to 2,000," according to membership chairman Mrs. John McVay.

"We are emphasizing sustaining monthly contributions by broad citizen participation to provide strong financial support for the county operation," added McVay. "A relatively few persons have been carrying the responsibility of all Democrats. Politics is everybody's business."

Romney Adds AMC Stock

A proxy statement issued last week by American Motors Corp. revealed that Gov. George Romney had purchased 13,494 shares of stock for \$99,000 less than the market price on the day before he resigned from the company last November.

The purchase was made possible because of previously granted stock options awarded to Romney and other top corporate officials Nov. 24, 1958. It boosted his holdings to about 118,000 shares, the largest held by any individual.

HIS RESIGNATION prevented his exercise of another option on 13,494 shares at \$9.91 per share. He would have been eligible to exercise the second option 10 days later. Market price when he exercised the first option was \$17.25 per share.

When Romney severed all connections with AMC on Nov. 15, he said he was placing his stock in trust while he was in office.

Youths Face Arraignment

Awaiting arraignment in the higher court Monday are David A. Staudt, 20, of Kellen Lane Bloomfield Township; Walter H. Riley, 19, of 573 Westchester, Birmingham; and Robert K. Ross, 19, of 509 Merritt Lane, Birmingham.

They are specifically charged with malicious destruction of property (a felony) — one of about \$150 damage done to a store window and mannequin in Jacobson's Men's Store. Total damage estimates have now reached \$450 according to police.
