3 High School Seniors Pass MSUO Course

Peter Toot of Groves High School, and Fred Pink and Tom Hoopengardner of Bloomfield Hills High School, are three of 25 high school seniors in the area who took and passed a college math course at Michigan State University (MSUO) in the center just ended.

All of the 25 will receive four hours of college credit for the course, in probability and statistics.

ONE OR TWO outstanding students were chosen to take the course by each of the 15 high schools in Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, Lake Orion, Oxford, Pontiac, Romeo, Royal Oak, Troy, Utica and Waterford.

An anonymous donor paid one-half of the \$72 tuition fee for each student chosen. The course was given in the evening so as to solve transportation and scheduling problems. It was taught by the head of MSUO's Mathematics Department, Dr. James McKay, associate dean for science.

Pink, Hoopengardner and Toot were three of 10 who received A's in the course.

JA Names Adams Head Of Campaign

Junior Achievement, the international non-profit business education organization for teen-agers, has announced the appointment of the chairman of its local 1963 fund campaign, which runs from Jan. 27 to Feb. 21.

Civil Service Opens New Clerical Exams

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced a new examination for filling clerical positions paying \$3,560 to \$3,880 a year in various Federal agencies in the Washington, D. C. area.

Appointments to these positions are apportioned among eligibles from the various states and territories.

Persons entitled to veteran preference and nonveterans from states in arrears of their apportionment quota will be given first employment consideration.

THE STATES of Kansas, North Dakota, Pennsylvania, Maine, North Carolina, Vermont, South Dakota, Nebraska, West Virginia, Virginia, Maryland and the District of Columbia are currently in arrears of their apportionment quota.

Therefore, applications will not be processed from persons who have legal or voting residence in

these areas unless they are entitled to veteran preference.

To qualify, applicants must pass a written test and have had appropriate education or experience. Applications must be filed with the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C. They must be received or postmarked not later than January 21, 1963.

Announcement No. 296 gives full information on the requirements to be met and instructions on how to apply.
