Orchard Lake Country Club started out as the dream of Willis C. Ward, who with his son, Harold L., donated 180 acres of land to a club corporation. The property was the site of the former Cuthbertson farm and included 200 feet of lake front. With Harold L. Ward as the first president, the newly organized club began its work. An 18-hole championship course was opened for play in 1927. A fire in 1942 destroyed the pro shop; another fire in 1961 caused \$25,000

damage to the country club's west wing, including the rebuilt pro shop. A \$140,000 remodeling program had been completed at Orchard Lake Country Club in 1951; more remodeling totaling \$200,000 followed the 1961 fire. Retires from Circuit Bench

The dean of the Oakland County Circuit Court judges, H. Russel Holland, announced his retirement from the bench last week. Judge Holland is celebrating his 65th birthday today and thus becomes eligible for state and county pensions. A party will be held tonight in his honor at a Bloomfield Hills restaurant. He has listed Feb. 15 as the effective date of the retirement after 27 years on the circuit court bench. He said his retirement application already has been filed with the county retirement commission.

EARLIER, HE was a municipal judge in Pontiac and a high school teacher in both Pontiac and Detroit.

Judge Holland listed "the fast tempo of the times" as one of the reasons for his stepping down from the bench.
