# There Shall Be Music



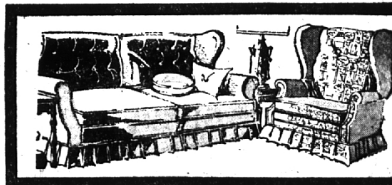
A dream became a reality last week when Birmingham Musicale's president, Mrs. John C. Wright, Jr., officially dedicated and presented to the Community House, a brand new concert grand piano. The ceremony preceded the Musicale's regular concert, for which Mrs. Teruko Yamasaki was guest pianist. The piano became a project last fall when Birmingham Musicale, a member of the National Federation of Music Clubs, spearheaded a drive called "Play for the Piano Week", calling upon residents of the Birmingham-Bloomfield area to engage in any card game whatsoever, just so long as proceeds were turned over to the piano fund. In the midst of a multitude of other worthwhile fund drives then being promoted in the community, money, time, effort and "hostess homes" were donated to the cause by public-spirited citizens. When the last week of September finally arrived—deadline for the drive—proceeds started rolling into the Community House, whose executive director, P. Ward Ouradnik, acted as trustee of funds. 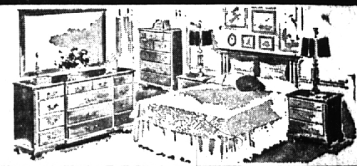
