Background information and other factual material stating both the pros and cons of each discussion topic have been prepared by the Foreign Policy Association-World Affairs Center.

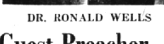
These will be supplemented by weekly newspaper articles and other reading, all of which will aid in discussion preparation.

Guest Preacher Will Inaugurate Week for Youth

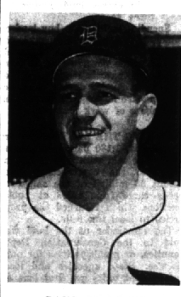

Tiger Pitcher Gives Speech At Banquet

Paul Foytack, right-handed pitcher with the Detroit Tigers, will be the featured speaker at a Father-and-Son banquet being held Friday at Our Shepherd Lutheran Church, 2225 E. 14 Mile. The event, sponsored by the women's club, will begin at 6:30 p.m.

Foytack, who recently moved to 5590 Taworth Place, Birmingham, has been a starting pitcher with the Tigers since 1956. Last year he pitched a 10-7 record to establish his sixth winning season in seven years in the majors.

FIRST SIGNED as a high school youngster in 1949, Foytack was a rubber-arm fastball specialist with control trouble during early stages of his career. With his "zipper" he used a good curve and later developed a palm ball.

He suffered arm trouble in 1950, his one losing year in the majors, but shortly afterwards developed a knuckleball which has proved very effective.
