'Exhausted Roosters' Prove It Isn't So!

One of the most successful dance clubs in southeastern Michigan was started in 1947 because a trio of "Exhausted Roosters" decided they were too young to "die."

At age 35, active membership

ends for Jaycees and they join the ranks of the has-beens, officially designated as Exhausted Roosters but more frequently paraphrased irreverently as "Exhausted." In a short time they have passed into oblivion as far as the organization is concerned, and even more unfortunate is the loss of friendships that have grown over a period of years.

But, on Jan. 19, the Saturday Club celebrated its fifteenth anniversary at a special dinner dance as proof that 25 doesn't have to be "the end."

RAY MICHAELS, J. Allen Harwood and Norman Burau, all former officers of the Detroit Junior Board of Commerce, decided in the fall of 1948 to make an effort to continue the friendships that had started in the Jaycees. They enlisted the aid of their wives and interested seven other Jaycee members in becoming gov-

ernors of the Saturday Club. From the beginning, growth was rapid and within four years a maximum membership was established.

During many of the past years, there has been a waiting list, with some applicants forced to wait as much as a year for admission.

SIX OF THE COUPLES who attended the first party, including two of the three who originated the idea, are still active in the group. Norm and Dot Burau, now treasurer, and Al and Evelyn Harwood, membership chairman, share charter member honors with Bob and Anne Breeck, president; Bob and Gwen Granger; Joe and Stella Vujakov, hall and food chairman, and Floyd and Pauline Zinn, secretary.

Parties always are held on the third Saturday of each month, October through April, omitting December. A single fee for the year

covers all costs, which are kept at a minimum by running the club on a non-profit basis, with board or club members performing most of the work gratis.

"OUR ORIGINAL objective of keeping old friends together and providing the opportunity for meeting new friends has been well met," says Harwood. "We are one of the oldest and most successful of the dance clubs in Michigan largely because we kept an eye on this original objective of the founders and because each of the 10 governors and officers of the club take their responsibilities seriously."

The club operates under a written set of by-laws, outlining duties and responsibilities and the board meets the first Wednesday of each month to review club activities. Since October, 1952, the parties have been held at Wendland Post Hall in Royal Oak.

THE UWFO is a year-round organization of 40,000 women who work in the Torch Drive. It was established in 1954 to bring about a better understanding of the United Foundation and the 195

agencies which are dependent upon it for finances. It sponsors functions at which volunteers are brought together and works toward bringing more women into Torch Drive work.

The Steering Committee is made up of 200 women who have demonstrated leadership in their Torch Drive work.

A year ago, the UWFO was reorganized to place more emphasis on the six "counties" into which the Detroit area is divided for solicitation purposes.
