

UF Volunteers Gather To Learn of Torch Drive

Mrs. Paul Carey, 2206 Pine Crest, Ferndale, recruitment chairman for the Oakland County unit of the United Foundation Women's Organization, has announced that 1,500 representatives of religious and civic groups will meet in the J. L. Hudson Co. store in downtown Detroit on Tuesday and Wednesday to learn more about the Torch Drive.

A highlight of the sessions will be the introduction of presidents of participating groups.

These will include Mrs. Webster Owen, 13744 San Quentin, Lathrup Village, president of the Girl Scouts of Southern Oakland County, and Mrs. Sidney W. Smith, Jr., 210 Abbey Road, Birmingham, president of the Junior League of Birmingham.

THE MEETINGS will be held in the mornings, with coffee served in the 13th floor dining room at 9:45 a.m., the meetings in the 12th floor auditorium. On Tuesday, 750 representatives of religious groups, Catholic, Protestant and Jewish, will attend.

On Wednesday, 750 representatives of organizations such as P.T.A., American Legion Auxiliary, College Women's Volunteer Service, Women's Clubs, Girl Scouts, H. C. Leagues, Junior Leagues, Women's Hospital, Y.W.C.A., Y.M.C.A. and all Torch Drive agencies have been invited.

Speakers at the Tuesday session will include Dr. Allan Zaun, president of the Detroit Council of Churches; Rabbi M. Robert Syme, Temple Israel, and Father Thomas J. Cain, St. Maurice Church, Livonia.

They will tell of the importance of Torch Drive success to the operation of agencies in which they are interested.

LAURENTINE COLLINS, divisional director of School Community Relations for the Detroit Board of Education, will discuss "New Horizons in Hope, Health and Happiness." Mrs. J. Walden Retan, 2158 Lenon, Grosse Pointe, will tell of "The United Foundation in the Eye of a Newcomer."

Mrs. Harold J. Schachern, 15756 Vaughan, recruitment chairman for the United Foundation Women's Organization, will preside at the Tuesday session and will explain the new recruitment program.

Under this program, recruitment of women volunteers who will solicit for the 1963 Torch Drive, to be held Oct. 15 through Nov. 7, will place more responsibility upon individual groups of the major women's organizations.

INSTEAD OF asking organizations for as many recruits as possible, they will be asked for only five new recruits each. They will work closely with U.F.W.O. recruitment chairmen in each UP area.

Miss Collins will preside at the Wednesday meeting. Mrs. Worth Kramer of Bloomfield Hills, newly elected chairman of the U.F.W.O., will be introduced.

Mrs. Schachern will explain the recruitment program. Two Torch Drive agencies will present their needs.

Oakland County Vehicles Total Nearly 350,000

A total of 348,436 motor vehicles of all types were registered by the Department of State in Oakland County during 1962, according to a Michigan Department of State report.

These included 290,060 passenger cars, 26,320 trucks and commercial vehicles, 953 farm commercials, 23,898 trailers, 2,370 trailer coaches, 2,275 motorcycles and 2,560 police cars and other municipal vehicles.

Secretary of State James M. Hare says the total weight tax money collected in Oakland County was \$5,425,098.89.

"Collection of weight taxes in Michigan last year increased to \$1,640,525.96, from \$66,870,122.57 in 1961 to \$68,515,538.53 in 1962," he states.

"The total number of vehicles of all kinds registered rose only 111,228, from 3,758,010 in 1961 to 3,869,238 last year."

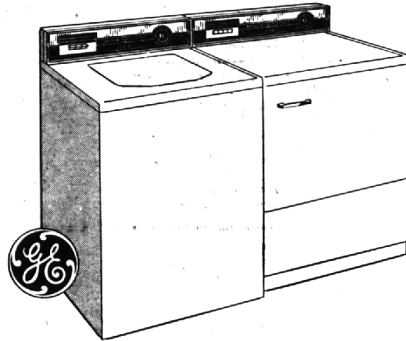

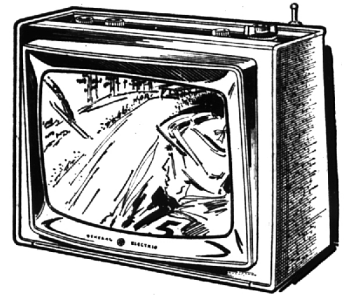

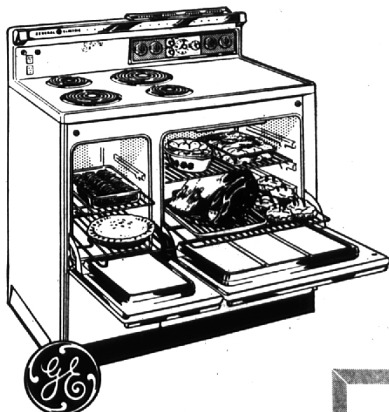
