Fred Pew is directing, assisted by Ruth Scribner, while Isabelle (Mrs. Charles) Himehoch is the producer.

MORE DRAMA. This time with a coffeehouse flavor: Pam Bekolay stars at the Stables Theatre, where they serve hot coffee and a big slice of drama at 8:30 every night but Wednesday.

Pam is the daughter of the John Bekolays of Beverly Hills. And even if she is one of our home town products, we have to brag about her. She has studied hard at Will-O-Way Apprentice Theatre and is developing into a fine actress.

Opening lead:

Good bridge reasoning and logic brought about this slam. Gloria knew that her hand was worth much more in clubs than in no trump and Hilda knew that she would have to bid the slam to attain as many points in a minor suit as she would have received in no trump.

The opening spade lead was won by Hilda in the closed hand and she knew that she must find either the club king or diamond king on side to bring in the contract. When

she found the diamond king on side, it merely became a case of "Dummy-reverse" to bring in the slam for all the points.

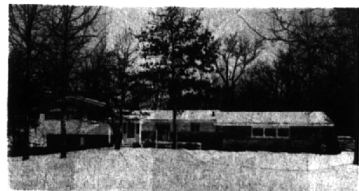
