Recently I have been making my way through a book by Stuart Chase, "Power of Words." Communication is the general theme of the text which dips into such things as the theory of relativity, a brief history of semantics, group dynamics and thoughts about mass media. The author's style is clear and concise, but it is not fast reading. There is at least one thought per paragraph that wants pondering.

There are several facts in the book which I found reassuring. For instance, if you've ever had a science fiction nightmare about giant computers and "machines that think" taking over the world—relax. Chase states the normal brain has 10 to 15 billion nerve cells and when the book was published in 1954, the latest mechanical computer had 23,000 valves. The number has probably increased substantially in the last nine years, but the gap far from closed.

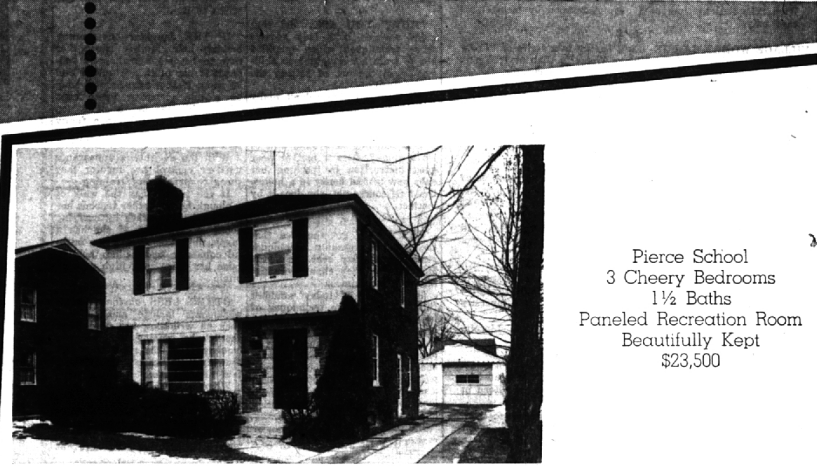

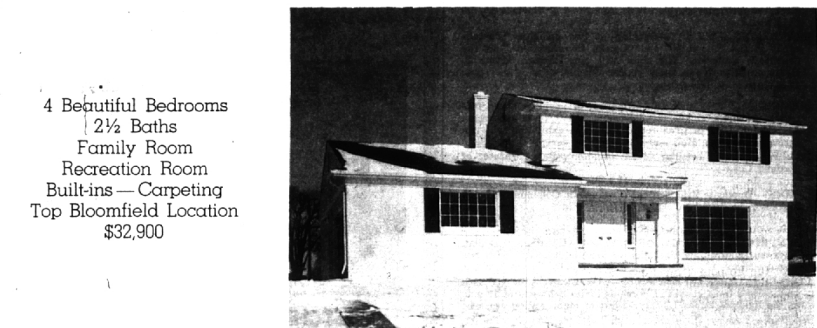

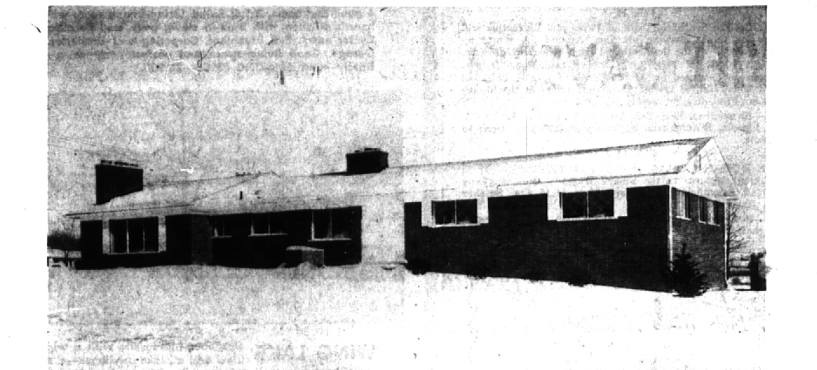
