Local Business Women Celebrate Their Week

Business Women's Week, Oct. 6-12, will be recognized all over the United States by more than 170,000 members of the National Federation of Business & Professional Women's Clubs.

Michigan members will start off this week of festivities with a dinner in Lansing, Monday at the Civic Auditorium, honoring women in government.

District 10 is one of 11 districts in the Michigan State Federation, with more than 600 members and comprising all of Oakland County, Highland Park, part of Detroit and Bad Axe.

The district membership will congregate at 5 p.m. at the Plaza Shopping Center in Farmington, and cars will be waiting to transport them to Lansing under State Police Escort. Drivers of the cars are BPW members.

CATHERINE PEDIN, of Louisville, Ky., a past national president, will be the keynote speaker of the evening.

Individual clubs will have various meetings celebrating this week. The Birmingham and Southfield Clubs will join together for a "Bosses Night Dinner" Wednesday in Southfield.

Dorothy Mignault, the new director of the Metropolitan Detroit YWCA, will be the guest speaker.

The closing of Business Women's Week will be a banquet in Detroit, Oct. 12. National President Virginia Allan of Wyandotte will be the honored guest, and Mrs. Esther Petersen, assistant secretary of labor, will be the keynote speaker.

In addition to the above, Michigan women will journey to Washington, D. C. Oct. 19, where the grand piano, a gift of Michigan women to Miss Allan for National Headquarters, will be dedicated.

It is expected that several bus loads of passengers will leave this area in addition to other travelers going by plane and automobile.

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'Good Seats Still Available' For Lions Club's Concert

The concert is scheduled for 8:30 p.m. Wednesday in the Birmingham Theatre.

NERO IS A 28-year-old pianist-entertainer whose style blends classical and jazz.

The classical influence is apparent since he began at the keyboard when he was seven; by the time he was 14, he had made symphony hall appearances and had been awarded a scholarship to Juilliard.

AT 19, HE appeared on Arthur Godfrey's "Talent Scouts" and won first prize which eventually led to a national tour with Paul Whiteman.

Since then he has been on many television programs and has recorded six albums: "Piano For," "New Piano in Town," "Young and Warm and Wonderful," "For the

it was felt that need had already been determined.

Lou Sharkoff, father vice president of the PTA at Quanton, told the commission that they "must provide facilities" for youngsters on a neighborhood basis.

He said his group had been ordered to find out why the commission had shelved the project last month.

"What are we doing to provide wholesome recreational facilities?" Sharkoff said.

HE REFERRED to recent articles in The Eccentric that have brought to light the problem of teen-agers and "woodwarding."

Sharkoff noted that this type of activity must be stopped and that the tennis courts might be a step in the right direction.

Recreational studies have shown that tennis courts usually attract teens and young adults.

Concern by Glenhurst residents that lights might be installed on the courts was quickly quelled by Mayor William H. Burgum.

"THERE HAS never been any intention of erecting lights on the courts," Burgum said. He also assured the residents adequate screening would be placed around the courts.

In the wintertime the courts will be used for a natural ice rink, Burgum said.

Contracts Awarded For Access Drives

A \$5,585 contract was awarded by Birmingham city commissioners Monday night for the construction of access drives at the Birmingham House Motel and in front of the Becker Orthopedic Clinic on S. Woodward.

The contract went to the lower bidder on the project, Alva L. Greer and Sons of Roseville.

City Engineer William T. Killen said although the bid was about four per cent higher than his department's estimate it was still reasonable and acceptable.

Killen said the Greer Co. had undertaken two projects for the city within the last three years and is "well qualified" to handle the job. The work is expected to be completed by Nov. 1.

The general meeting of the Women's Society of Christian Service of the Franklin Community Church will be held at 12 noon Oct. 22.

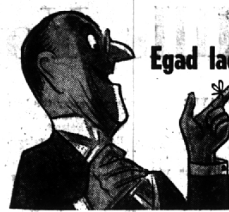

mayor does not think it would be a serious one.
