## Kick-Off Luncheon Heralds Ingathering

The section presidents and directors of the Birmingham-Bloomfield Hills branch of the Needlework Guild of America gathered at the Bloomfield Open Hunt Club for a luncheon meeting Sept. 25. The speaker for the day was Dr. Alexander Zaphris, executive director of the Michigan Childrens Aid Society of Oakland County, representing one of the 11 agencies served by the Guild.

Dr. Zaphris stressed the need for infants clothing from size 0 to 3, and pointed out the many neglected children in Oakland County whose physical needs must be met. He told heartwarming stories of children who could not have gone

to school had it not been for the contributions of money and clothing by the Needlework Guild.

THE ANNUAL INGATHERING of the two, new, identical garments, that traditionally each member contributes, will be held at the Birmingham Unitarian Church on Oct. 15. To be eligible for membership, one need only make or buy two articles of equal size, suitable for a man, woman, or child, or for use in the home, or make a financial contribution. The goal of the Needlework Guild is to provide clothing for needy families—one to wash and one to wear.

Anyone wishing to become a part of this national organization, which has contributed over 70 million garments in its 74-year history, need only call the membership chairman, Mrs. William Morrison, 1451 Cedar, Birmingham. Membership is open to everyone, young and old, individuals or groups. The Guild welcomes all.

Mrs. John Judd, president, made a report on last year's accomplishments. Members contributed a total of \$3,040 and 5,000 articles of clothing and household goods. Several Girl Scout Troops donated their time and sewing talents to the cause by making 695 garments last year alone. Mrs. Judd also announced the new board members. They include Mrs. James Fox, Mrs. George Squibb, Mrs. Wesslau Wright and Mrs. F. C. Reith.

THE BIRMINGHAM-BLOOMFIELD BRANCH of the Needlework Guild was started by Mrs. Carleton Patterson in 1932, and has grown each year as the needs have increased, until now it aids 11 agencies throughout Oakland County. The Guild needs help to continue its fine work.
