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Indian Guides Bolsters Dad-Son Ties

The Birmingham YMCA has begun sending announcements home about the Indian Guide program. Perhaps you have seen the paper. Just who are the Indian Guides, anyway? Why should you want to join?

The Indian Guides program is a Y-sponsored national organization for fathers and sons. Its purpose is to strengthen the relationship between them.

It provides an opportunity for a busy dad to participate in a variety of projects with his son at a time when the boy most needs to identify with the masculine role. This idea is based on a premise of the American Indian, which held fathers responsible for training the young males of the tribe.

Because of its wide appeal, the program is one of the fastest growing organizations in the country. In the Birmingham area alone, the Guides have expanded from 12 tribes six years ago, to the present 56 tribes, and are still growing.

The tribe, which consists of no less than six and no more than nine fathers and their sons, meets for one hour in the evening twice a month, during the school year. These tribal meetings are held in turn at the members' homes, and little braves may not attend without their dads, as every project is done together.

Each tribe is free to choose its own projects, which may include nature study, team games, the making of Indian costumes, hikes, swimming, or whatever is particularly interesting to the individual tribe.

been the sale of Christmas trees, and most of the tribes participate in the autumn campout, which this year will be on Oct. 26 and 27.

A winter skating party, three spring campouts, one of which is a canoe trip, and a Crow Moon powwow in March for all the tribes are annual events.

Once a month the Birmingham tribes, which form seven Indian nations, have a Long House or Federation meeting. Long House chief is Paul Faubel; assistant chief, Walt Anderson, tally keeper, Brad Ballard; wampum bearer, Bob Starnes; and the state wampum keeper of all Long Houses in Michigan, who has been elected for a period of two years, is Birmingham resident, Hugh Acton.

If your family already has a Y membership, there will be no additional charge to join the Guides. A non-Y father and son may join for \$10.
