SHOOTING TIME TABLE FOR MIGRATORY BIRDS

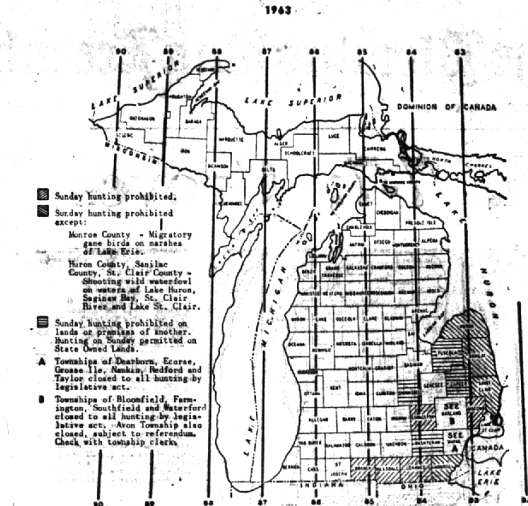


Table with columns for date, time, and location, detailing shooting regulations for migratory birds across Michigan.
