## Area Cub Scouts Plan For Wow of a Pow-Wow

Cub Scouting spirit and activity will reach a new high this November during the 1963 Cubber's Pow-Wow.

More than 1,000 parents from the Birmingham area who are active in the Cub Scout program are expected to participate. Included in the program agenda is a four-hour session of specialized training, a full-course dinner, and an hour or more of evening entertainment.

Aimed to demonstrate and convey the latest Cub Scout ideas and objectives, the Pow-Wow is a full day program for leaders and parents. It is a cooperative learning experience divided into five separate sections including "Games and Playways," "Ceremonies," "Pack Administration," "Webelos Den" and the "Thesaurus."

THE STAFF planning and working on these sections include Bill Hill, Dave Perault, Walter Schaffner, Harold Reid and Norm Roller. These sections are considered the most important phases of the Cub Scout program.

The Pow-Wow for the 276 Cub Scout Packs in this district will be held Nov. 9 at Southfield High School, 24075 Lahser Road. Opening at 12 noon, the program will continue until 9 p.m. Saturday evening.

In addition to the five separate sections, a gigantic midway will line the corridors, providing a display of den and pack projects, games and props.

RESERVATIONS are now being taken, and it is suggested that those planning to attend make their reservations now through their pack leaders. Parents interested may also obtain information from Boy Scout Headquarters, Detroit.

The registration fee includes the complete training section, materials and literature, dinner and entertainment.
