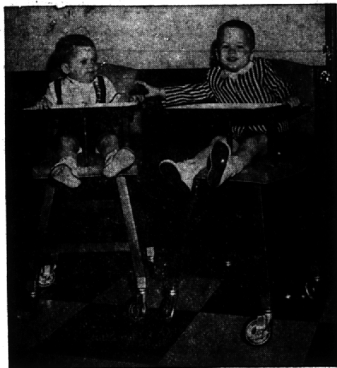

LOST ON MOUNTAIN

Troy Girl, Brother Die in Arizona Heat

A Troy family's search for a better life in California ended in tragedy near Phoenix, Ariz., Thursday night when two children died of heat exhaustion and exposure while attempting to climb a mountain.

The bodies of Claire Carter, 15, and her sister, Starr Lynn, 13, were discovered Friday less than three miles apart in the thickets at the base of Newmann's Mountain, a 3,500-foot peak 50 miles south of Phoenix.

Discovery of the bodies ended one of the biggest searches in southern Arizona in years. Men on horseback, in jeeps and on foot, from the air by helicopter, combed the rugged desert country.

THE CHILDREN'S parents, Mr. and Mrs. Claire Alfred Carter, sold their home at 720 E. South Blvd. two weeks ago and left for San Diego where they hoped to find a better, healthier life.

The Carter family and other members of a four-car caravan had stopped at a highway park for a rest.

With Claire and Starr Lynn when they left the park was Douglas Brainerd, 17, their stepbrother, who managed to find his way back and gave the alarm that the others were lost.

BRAINERD TOLD deputy sheriffs that he became separated from the others after they had climbed for two or three hours. He said he wandered around looking for them.

"Then I heard Butch (Claire's

nickname) calling," he said. "I ran in that direction and he came running toward me, shouting hysterically. I asked about Starr and had to slap him a couple of times before I was able to get out of him that Starr had fainted and was back up the mountain."

Brainerd said he pointed out the direction of the park to Claire and told him to go back while he hunted for the girl.

"I DIDN'T find her. I realized I needed help. So I went back. When I got there I found Butch wasn't back," Brainerd said.

Claire and Starr Lynn attended the Seventh Day Adventist School at 251 Morse in Troy last year, but did not return this fall. Another daughter, Connie, 16, was a student at the Adventist school in Pontiac. A fourth child, John, 6, does not attend school.

John H. Edwards, vice president of the Pacific Cab Co., Royal Oak, where Carter had worked for eight years, said one of the reasons for Carter's move to California was to obtain relief for arthritis which hit his feet and ankles.

"HE'D ALWAYS worked hard here, saying to support more people than he probably could afford to. He was a gas station attendant and he worked in a small shop when he wasn't driving a cab for us, but he couldn't be on his feet long."

Meridian said his cab company had contributed \$100 and drivers and others who knew Carter added \$65 in order that the grief-stricken father might realize his wish to bury the children in San Diego.

The remaining members of the Carter family left Arizona Sunday on the last leg of their journey.

Detroit Bank, Trust Report Earnings Up

The Detroit Bank and Trust Co. has announced that net operating earnings for the first nine months of 1963 were \$7,060,287 equal to \$3.66 a share.

This compares with \$6,285,925 or \$3.25 a share for the first nine months of 1962, according to Raymond T. Perring chairman and Charles H. Hewitt, president of the bank.

Total deposits amounted to \$1,043,838,413, compared with \$943,496,490 on Sept. 30, 1962. Demand deposits were \$496,236,513, up from the total of \$469,376,638 on the same date last year. Savings and time deposits increased to a figure of \$547,401,901, showing a gain from \$480,080,858 a year ago.

Scout Troops Will Conduct Clothing Drive

The Detroit Area Council, Boy Scouts of America, largest Scout Council in the world, will complete the biggest clothing drive ever attempted in the United States on Nov. 30.

One week previous, Nov. 23, Boy Scouts and Explorers will deliver clothing bags to homes in the Council area.

The purpose of the Thanksgiving "Good Turn" drive is to provide an adequate supply of clothing and shoes during the winter months for the 400 physically handicapped men and women who receive training and employment at Goodwill Industries of Greater Detroit.

Twenty thousand Boy Scouts, Explorers and their leaders will distribute and collect 400,000 Goodwill clothing bags.

The Detroit Boy Scout Council area takes in all of Southern Oakland, Wayne County, and Southern Macomb Counties.

EACH SCOUT unit will be assigned an area. On Nov. 23, Scouts will deliver empty bags to homes in the area. Householders are asked to fill the bags with clothing and shoes and leave these on their front porch by 10 a.m. Nov. 30. The Scouts will collect filled bags and take them to corner locations in their area.

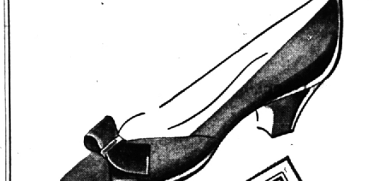
Trucks donated by Detroit trucking firms and industry and driven by volunteer union drivers will take the material to the central Goodwill warehouse, or to conveniently located trailers parked throughout the Council collection area.

There will be about 250 to 300 trucks used in the drive.

Scout leaders will be at telephone at Goodwill Industries on pickup day to receive calls from each area in case of truck breakdown or miscalculations.

VOLUNTEER loading and unloading crews will assist at the central warehouse and at area locations. These volunteers will come from various youth groups in churches, colleges, Y.M.C.A. and service organizations.

In addition to Scouts, Explorers and Leaders there will be at least 1,000 volunteer workers.
