League to Study Agency Work of United Nations

October is United Nations Month in the League of Women Voters of Birmingham. Neighborhood unit meetings will focus on the "heart" of the UN, the humanitarian agencies which are working to raise living standards around the world.

Through a case study of United Nations actions in Libya, league members will examine the programs of the International Labor Organization, UNESCO and other specialized agencies to determine the respective roles the UN and the United States should play in helping underdeveloped countries achieve economic self-sufficiency.

THIS IS the final stage of the United Nations study on which the membership will reach consensus later this month.

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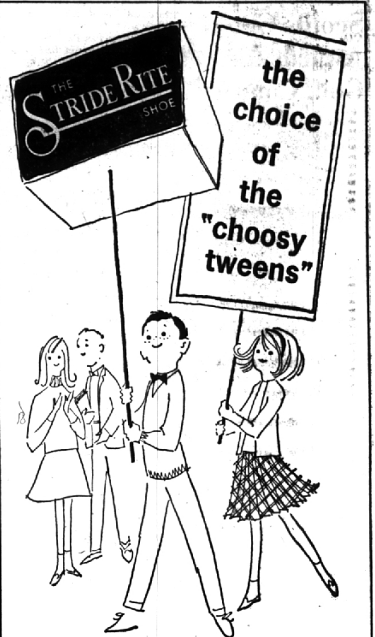
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
