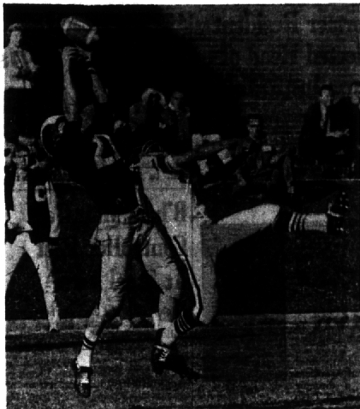

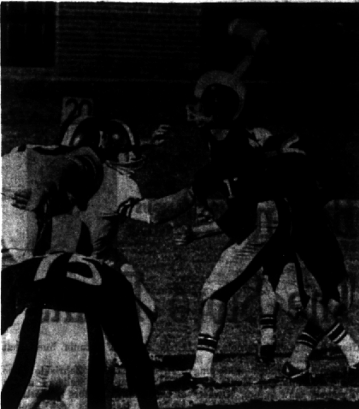
Eric Hoagland won the reserve meet for the Maples with a time of 11:40. Seaholm had 27 points. Second place Milford wound up with 50.

W-Kettering Outlasts Upset-Minded Cranes

Cranbrook's revitalized football team battled tough Waterford-Kettering to a stop on the ground, only to lose 13-6 when the Captains struck through the air.

The two teams traded touchdowns the first time each club got the ball, and then settled down to a grinding duel.

Kettering took the opening kickoff, and after getting a first down on their own 46, produced the game's first TD on second down.

Quarterback Mel Patterson hit halfback Jim Haviland on a slant-in. The quick Captain back shook a tackle and scampered 42 yards down the sidelines for the score. Earl Hook kicked the PAT.

But the Cranes came right back, and although they only completed three of 17 passes all afternoon, Crane quarterback Paul Shank put the three together in this drive.

Shank hit Norb Zuckerman for a first down, and aided by two interference penalties called against Kettering, the Cranes had a first down on the Waterford 15.

On a 3rd and 17 situation, Shank connected with end Buzz Mieras cutting across and the Crane end scooted into the end zone with the equalizer. But, the PAT was no good and Kettering led, 7-6.

Kettering got their last TD in the second period when Patterson again hit Haviland, this time for seven yards and a touchdown. John Goodman blocked the PAT.

Patterson was sharp throughout the game as he completed 10 of 18 passes, six of them to Haviland, who was a continual threat.

ALTHOUGH Cranbrook remained within striking distance, the Cranes could not put together another real threat and the two teams played to a scoreless second-half.

Cranbrook showed a lot on defense, and Carl Wilby, a converted fullback, went both ways for the Cranes.
