# Pontiac Man Accused In Twp. Rape Case

A 31-year-old Pontiac man has been bound over to Oakland County Circuit Court on charges of raping a young Waterford woman on April 13 in Bloomfield Township. Bail was continuing at \$50,000 for Louis Milton, Jr., of 404 Bagley, and he was remanded to Oakland County Jail by Justice Alce Gilbert of Bloomfield Township. He will be arraigned in circuit court at 1:30 p.m. Monday.

Milton was identified in a police lineup Saturday morning by the 19-year-old woman after he had been arrested in a dragnet thrown up by officers of seven area police departments.

THE SUSPECT was apprehended by Pontiac police at Nebraska and Hillmount, near St. Joseph Hospital, after he had been tracked down by a police dog named Milo, owned by Chief Norman Dehke of Bloomfield Township.

Police from Bloomfield Hills, Troy, the Sheriff's department and Orchard Lake also joined the chase.

## Hold Banquet On Industry And Research

James E. Webb, administrator, National Aeronautics and Space Administration, will be the guest speaker at the second annual Michigan Industry-University Research Conference, Banquet at Cobo main, Detroit, Wednesday.

Gov. George Romney; Lynn A. Townsend of Birmingham, president, Chrysler Corp.; Arjay R. Miller, president, Ford Motor Co., and other leaders from business, industry and universities will participate.
