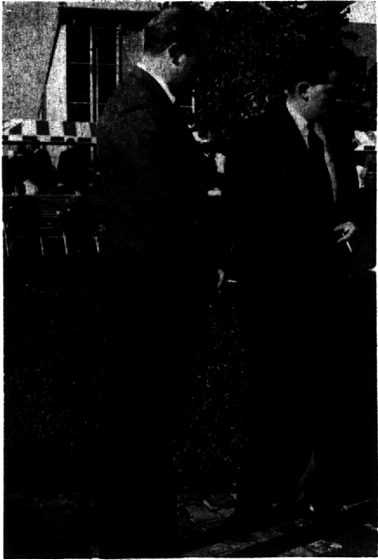


B'ham Follows the Horses in Final Meet of the Season

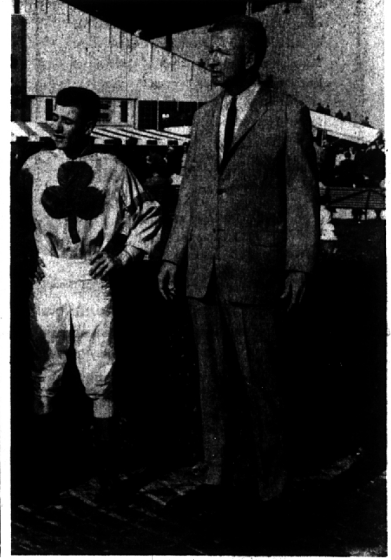
