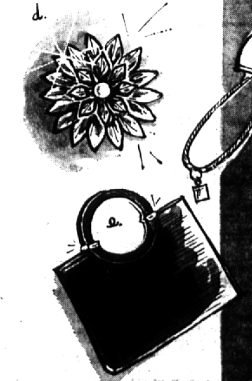
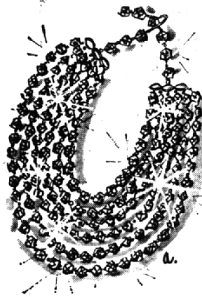
Exhibiting from the Birmingham-Bloomfield area are Mrs. William S. Dehn and Mrs. George W. Chelsey.

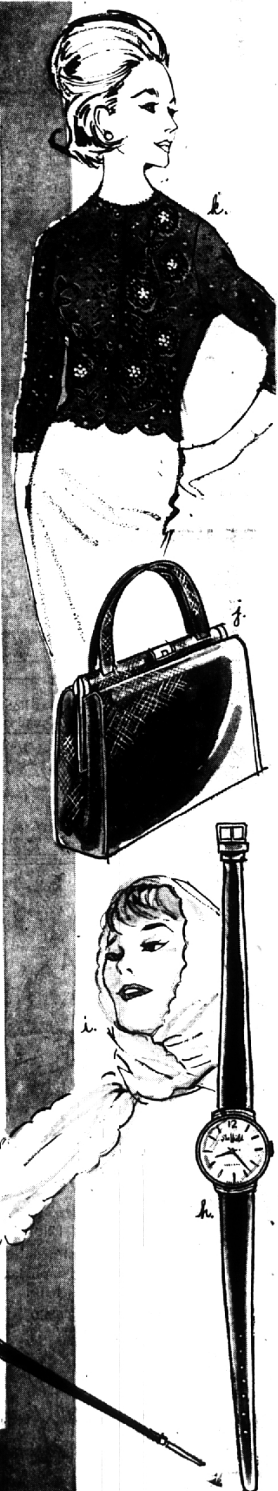
