The bidding was most usual, except for the double by Phyllis. This bid must be understood by the partner to defeat this contract, otherwise the North and South pair would receive a top board for a doubled contract.

This bid of the double calls for the unusual lead in this position. John put together the logic of the opponents bid and the request by his wife to make the unusual lead and did lead the ten of diamonds to defeat the contract. Just another example of this good partnership of the Malstroms that brings them top boards.

I thought I'd pass on the ruling, which was that this was proper action and the responder was within her rights.

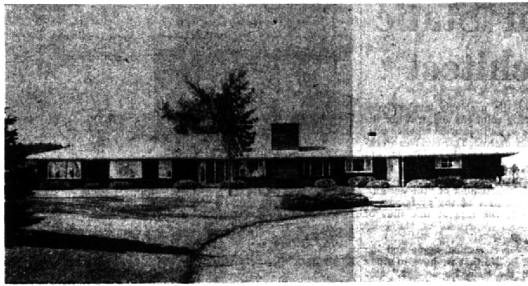
B'ham Residents on Committees for New Alumni Group

Three Birmingham residents are serving on committees for the newly-organized Alumni Association for the Wayne State University School of Business Administration.

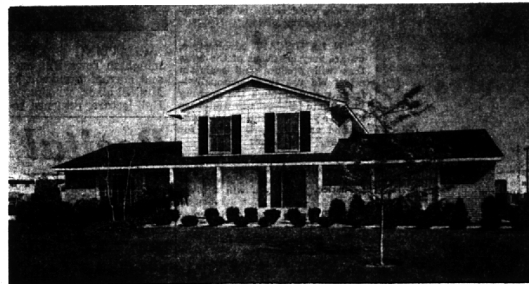
Robert W. Hague, 58 Manor Road, is treasurer of the organization and chairman of the finance committee.

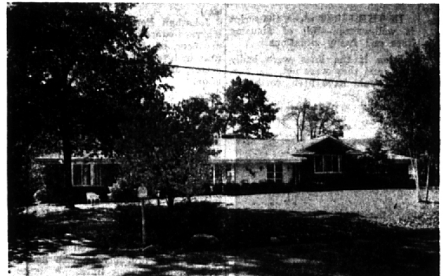
