## Cranes Drop Prep League Opener, 18-7

Cranbrook opened its football season in the Interstate Preparatory League Saturday on the wrong foot as the team slipped an 18-7 decision to Pittsburgh Shady Side.

Quarterback Tom Nary and halfback John Skina paced the Academy in its triumph over the Cranes although Cranbrook led at one time, 7-0.

Skina, who rolled up 152 yards in 17 carries, got Shady Side on the scoreboard in the second quarter with a 64-yard burst for a TD.

CRANBROOK came right back. After receiving the kickoff on the second pass, the Cranes marched 74 yards, largely on two pass plays, to score.

Quarterback Paul Shank connected with Bud Mieras for 29 yards and then found fullback Larry Willey for another 15 yards and the touchdown.

Willey, a linebacker who has been converted to fullback on offense by coach Pete Slender, romped home with the first touchdown of his career. Dick Mayerstein kicked the conversion and the Cranes led momentarily.

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## FEWER PHEASANTS

### Hunters Set to Open Small-Game Season

Michigan's small game season gets into full swing Monday, but pheasant hunters may be a little disappointed in the number of ring-necks available.

Latest reports have indicated that Michigan's pheasant crop is the lowest in years in contrast to early forecasts last June.

At that time, the state's pheasant hatch seemed to be above average, but since then, observations have indicated that this is not so.

MOST southern counties have recently reported an extreme lack of pheasants. The Thumb area, too, has witnessed a drop in the number of birds. Bob Denner, of Sebewaing, says pheasants in the area are lowest in numbers in recent years.

The pheasant season, along with rabbit, partridge, squirrel, raccoon and fox, opens Oct. 21 and runs to Nov. 10. The cottontail season runs through March 1, while white ruffed grouse is fair game until Nov. 19.

Squirrels appear plentiful all over and rabbits also seem to be on the increase. Woodcock, another of the state's migratory game birds, has started their southern flight, and hunters in this area may include them in their limits on Oct. 21, also.

GROUSE hunters' chances should improve since leaves have now started falling and visibility

in the woods is increasing. Woodcock will also be easier to see.

Due to the recent weather, fields and woods are drier than in many years, and although this should not bother pheasant hunters, rain would be a welcome aid to pat and woodcock followers.

Meanwhile, Michigan's duck hunters sit idly by waiting for that all but ruined the first two weeks of the season.

Ducks are not moving, and although flight ducks are arriving in Saginaw Bay, with some geese, the weather allows them to rest comfortably in open water all day long.

### Sportsmen's Isles

Michigan's more than 500 islands provide top recreation as the favorite habitat of wild fowl, according to the Michigan Tourist Council.

Many of the islands, located in the Great Lakes, are favored by fishermen who find such locations especially rewarding.

### Waters Unlimited

If Michigan streams and rivers were placed end-to-end they would reach one and one-half times around the Equator, according to the Michigan Tourist Council.

The state has more than 36,000 miles of rivers and streams.

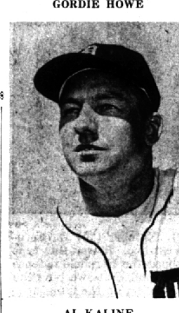
