

Committee Organizes For Community College

A new campaign for a community college in Oakland County got underway last week with the organization of a Community College Citizens Committee.

Twenty-eight persons, meeting in the Oakland Schools office near Pontiac, elected Wendell Brown of Farmington chairman of the newly-formed group.

Other officers include Mrs. George Mosher, 561 Mohagan, Birmingham, vice chairman; Harold J. Abrams of Pontiac, secretary; and Cedric Frick, 18138 Westover, Southfield, treasurer.

DR. WILLIAM J. Emerson, secretary of the Oakland Schools Board of Education, said that the board had asked that the meeting be convened to begin an organized effort to tell citizens the advantages of a community college.

"All board action on the community college issue," Dr. Emerson said, "has been predicated on the advice of citizens committees. The board actively solicits the advice and counsel of this group."

Two early meetings of the Citizens Committee will be devoted to study of the laws under which community colleges may be established and a review of the community college study of 1962.

Eugene W. Kuthy of Royal Oak, asked for representation of all school districts in the county on the Citizens Committee. Residents of 13 of 30 districts were present.

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Barnum Sets Open House For Parents

Another important part of the meeting will be the annual PTA membership and fund-raising drive. The funds are used to purchase special equipment and other aids for Barnum students and their school.

A 58-year-old Pontiac Township man suffered serious injuries Monday when his car crashed into a water main under construction in Bloomfield Township.

George Khanor, 58, who is being treated for multiple fractures, was listed in poor condition by St. Joseph Mercy Hospital officials.

THE ACCIDENT occurred on Adams, south of South Boulevard, where large concrete sections are awaiting use in the construction of the main which will bring Detroit water to the township.

cently approved a one per cent increase on the sales tax, they recognize the fact that it is necessary, he said.

THE GOVERNOR'S tax proposal calls for special relief from the beer tax for Michigan breweries. It recommends that up to 25,000 barrels of beer produced by breweries not in excess of 60 per cent of total production be exempt from the beer tax.

Hogan said that although the small breweries will gain by the move, large concerns will not receive noticeable advantages.

THE GOVERNOR'S plan is designed to help the beer industry, which is supposedly being injured by competition from out-of-state breweries.

ACCORDING to Hogan, wholesalers are being injured for another reason.

"In prosperous times such as these a man with a dollar in his pocket instead of 50 cents will buy a pint of whiskey rather than a six-pack of beer," he said.

The tax program proposes that the state take about 20 per cent of each taxpayer's school property tax bill.

This move would be advantageous for the farmer, since his taxes would be reduced by 15 per cent, Hogan said. However, the local school systems will get back the lost revenue through millage plans over three or four years.

UNDER THE governor's program, senior citizens with an annual income of less than \$2,000 and who own a house worth less than \$10,000 may defer a payment of property taxes up to \$200 per year.

The accumulated deferred taxes would be placed as a lien against the property.

The burden would be placed upon the heirs of the senior citizen, Hogan said. When the homestead is sold, the state would take the lien from the sale value of the property.

In spite of the apparent indication at the Capitol, Hogan said he expects a verdict will be reached on the tax proposal by Nov. 15 to start implementation of the new State Constitution.

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YOUR GARDEN CLINIC

1. Water, water everywhere—But NOT IN THE RIGHT PLACES.

Keep the sprinklers going so the ground will be well saturated when the freeze comes. Deciduous trees as well as evergreens need this attention.

Methods—
 a) Drill 2" holes 2 ft. apart, starting 2 ft. from trunk and going out to tips of branches.

b) Use a Ross Root Feeder which attaches to hose and uses cartridges.

3. JOIN US FOR FUN ON SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 2ND, CIDER & DO-NUT HOLES.

4. DO NOT LET THE LEAVES REMAIN ON THE LAWN. They will ruin it. Take it easy and use a PARKER-SPRINGFIELD SWEEPER—8 bu. 28" PARKERETTE—5 1/2 bu. 20" PARKERETTE—4 bu.

5. SNOW MOULD—If you had it in your lawn last spring just after the snow banks melted you should plan to:—
 SPRAY AFFECTED AREAS WITH TERSAN. This should be done after the first snow fall this fall.

6. MOUSE & RABBIT DAMAGE. Care should be taken to protect roses, shrubs, young trees, etc.

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Chairmen Ask Legislation on Civil Rights

Oakland County party chairmen, Republican Charles L. Lyle and Democrat Sander M. Levin, and their coordinators of a newly-appointed Human Relations Committee have asked state law-makers for civil rights legislation.

The request was sent to the seven State Legislators serving from Oakland County. They include Rep. Henry M. Hogan, Jr. (R-Bloomfield Hills), and Sen. Farrell E. Roberts (R-West Bloomfield Township).

SOUGHT BY the appeal in legislation during the present special session that will provide sufficient funds for the new Civil Rights Commission and that will implement the new Constitution in this area.

The bi-partisan Human Relations Committee coordinators who signed the request are Republican Arthur W. Saltzman and Democrat J. Russell Bright. Their committee was created by the County Board of Supervisors recently.

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
