

Defendant Enters Plea Of Not Guilty

Louis Milton, Jr., 31, of Pontiac, pleaded not guilty to a charge of rape in an arraignment before Judge Frederick C. Ziem in Oakland County Circuit Court Monday.

Milton was released, pending his circuit court trial. No date was set for the trial.

MILTON, ARRESTED by Pontiac police Oct. 12, is accused of raping a 19-year-old Waterford woman in Bloomfield Township April 13. He was trapped in a dragnet thrown up by seven area police departments after he had been identified as a prowler by two Bloomfield Township youths.

Milton was identified in a police lineup by the victim of the attack.

S. A. Dodge Dies Suddenly

Services took place Saturday in the William R. Hamilton Co., Detroit, for S. A. Dodge, one of the founders and president of Leader Dogs for the Blind.

Mr. Dodge, 70, of 621 Lone Pine Road, Bloomfield Hills, died suddenly Saturday in his home. He was president of the International Association of Lions Clubs in 1953-4 and a member of the North-west Lions Club of Detroit.

With two other men, Mr. Dodge founded Leader Dogs for the Blind in 1939 and gained support for it from the Lions Organized in 1945. A 1917 graduate of the University of Michigan, Mr. Dodge was a retired certified public accountant. He retired in 1945 as president and board chairman of Solventol Chemical Products, Inc., Detroit. He was a member of the Metropolitan YMCA advisory board, the First Presbyterian Church of Birmingham and the Detroit Athletic Club. A 32nd degree Mason and Shriner, he belonged to the Moslem Shrine in Detroit.

He is survived by his wife, Vera; a son, John L. of Charlotte, N. C.; a daughter, Mrs. Catherine Hadwin of Detroit; five grandchildren and a great-grandson.

Burial was in Evergreen Mausoleum. The family suggests contributions can be made to Leader Dogs for the Blind, Rochester.

Mrs. Kim (Mae) Sigler, 69, died Tuesday in Coshocton, Ohio, where she was being treated at Ruth Wilson Hurley Manor for multiple sclerosis. Widow of former Michigan Gov. Clegg, she had lived in Coshocton for the last five years. Her late husband, one of Michigan's most controversial governors, was killed in a 1953 plane crash.

Mrs. Sigler met her husband while they were both students in Ann Arbor and they were married in 1917, while Sigler was working in the Ford Highland Park Plant to finance his law studies at the University of Detroit.

In 1946 she accompanied her 54-year-old husband to Lansing as the state's First Lady, following her husband's surprise victory over Democratic Gov. Murray Van Wagoner. Public support was back of Sigler following his role as grand jury prosecutor in a graft investigation which resulted in 41 convictions. Some of those found guilty were members of the Legislature.

Mrs. Sigler is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Betty Slattery of Pacific Grove, Calif. and Mrs. Richard Gossett of McAlester, Okla.; a sister, Mrs. Bess Ender of Goodrich, Mich.; a brother, F. J. Fierchard, Jr.

Funeral services will take place Friday in the First Methodist Church, Hastings, with burial following in the family plot in Riverside Cemetery.

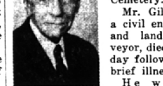
Death Takes Mr. Gillespie

The low bids were \$12,387 for Willow Road and \$10,656 for Square Lake Road.

THE BOARD reluctantly accepted the bids.

"We have no alternative but to accept the bids as we have a contract with the county to participate in half the cost," board members agreed.

"We are going to have to get more realistic estimates from the road commission before we sign any more such agreements," was the general sentiment of the board expressed by member Walter Whitmer.

Rehard explained to the board that county road officials have not wanted to go to the expense of having actual engineering estimates made until they are assured by signed contracts that the township is going to financially participate in the road improvement program.

IT WAS THIS point that Rehard discussed with county officials.

Rehard pointed out that when the township sets up sewer districts, it has to go to the expense of getting engineering costs without any assurance that the sewer district will be accepted by residents of the special assessment district.

He said that county officials seemed to be impressed by his argument.

"I believe we can get realistic engineering estimates as to the cost in future matching-funds projects," he said.

Two-Year Terms Can't Make Four In County Offices

State Atty. Gen. Frank Kelley ruled last week that Michigan's elected county officials will be required to run in the 1964 election terms and applied only to offices on as of Jan. 1 would apply to present office-holders.

Kelley said the Constitution had no provision for extending current terms and applied only to offices following election in 1964.
