

## Retreat Topic To Highlight Dinner Event

The first retreat was held in 1926; Manresa was the first retreat house for laymen in Michigan.

The 990-H includes as standard equipment a 270-horsepower V-8 engine, front and simulated rear bucket seats with folding center arm rests, a floor console between the front seats, chrome ceiling bows, and many luxury appointments associated with the prestige car field.

**THE COMPANY'S** top-selling Classic line boasts a new luxury two-door hardtop in the popular 770 series, available as a "six" or V-8.

The new hardtops feature a "fastback" roof which flows at a rakish angle into the body. Hardtops are 1.2 inches lower than sedan models.

All Ambassadors include a full wrap-around instrument panel crush pad which continues back into the upper portions of the doors. Other Ambassador features include distinctive wood-grain inserts on the instrument panel and door panels, lower door scuff pads

made of the same material as the floor carpeting and custom seats.

**A NEW OPTIONAL** feature on the Ambassador 990 is a bucket seat combination with a special between-seat cushion which permits a third person in the front. This combination also has a folding armrest for added comfort of the driver and passenger. A console replaces the center cushion if desired.

Both the Classic and Ambassador feature new grilles. The design is of spaced bars on a horizontal plane.

**THE FRONT** bumpers have been moved forward 1.2 inches to afford greater grille protection. This brings the overall length of sedans to 190 inches and the wagon to 190.5 inches. Wheelbase continues at 112 inches.

The rear panel on the 1964 Rambler Classic and Ambassador sedans displays special styling treatment with a new indented section on the rear roof pillar. On Ambassador models this treatment is accentuated with a chrome panel plus three chrome accent lines in the indented area.

All '64 Classic and Ambassador models have rocker panels covered with stainless steel. In addition to the added beauty, these panels provide protection against flying stones and gravel chips.

**NEW FULL** wheel discs are standard on Classic 770 and Ambassador 990 and 990-H models and optional on others.

The Ambassador line is concentrated in 990 four-door sedans, five-door two-seat station wagons

two-door hardtops and the 990-H two-door hardtop. An optional third seat is available for the station wagons.

Similar body styles are available in the Rambler Classic line, plus two-door sedans. Each body style is available as a 550, 650 or 770.

The new two-door Classic hardtop is available only as a 770.

The standard Ambassador engine on all models except the 270-horsepower 990-H hardtop is a 250-horsepower V-8. The 270-horsepower engine is optional on other Ambassador models.

The cast iron block is standard with an aluminum block engine optional.

**A NEW OPTION** for 1964 is the Adjust-O-Tilt steering wheel, which permits easier entry and exit with seven optional positions to suit the driver's preference.

The 1964 Ramblers emphasize long-life features such as the ceramic-armor muffler and tailpipe system; 30,000-mile chassis lubrication; 4,000-mile oil change interval; galvanized body panels; special rust protection before painting and other quality features.

Eleven of the 14 paint colors offered for 1964 are new. Seven are high-metallic.

Additional interior and upholstery features have been added. The 1964 radios are all-transistor and a new AM-FM version is offered. The regular rear-seat speaker is offered on sedans and hardtops.

The heating and air conditioning systems are redesigned for easier and more efficient operation.

## Speech Experts Tell How Child Affects Others

Children affect their own environment, speech correctionists from Oakland County were told at a conference at Oakland Schools offices recently.

Dr. Richard Schiefelbusch, director of the Bureau of Child Research and professor of Speech Pathology at the University of Kansas, reminded the 30 speech correctionists of the way a normal baby, kicking and cooing in his crib, brings pleasant reactions from adults who come near him.

"THE HANDICAPPED" child affects the adults who deal with him, too," Schiefelbusch said "but in ways that add to his problem. He is restricted and ignored. He bothers people."

"Those who work with handicapped children must be able to back off, mentally, and watch how they are behaving toward the child before they can evaluate the child's response," Schiefelbusch said.

The meeting was a monthly conference planned by Dr. Gerald Freeman, Oakland Schools speech pathologist, to help keep current speech correctionists abreast of their rapidly developing field.

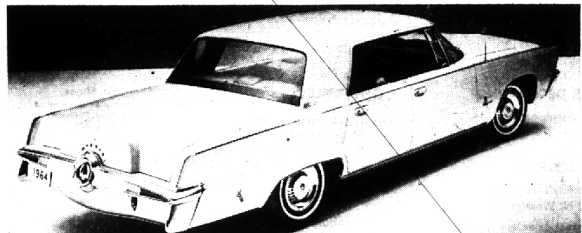

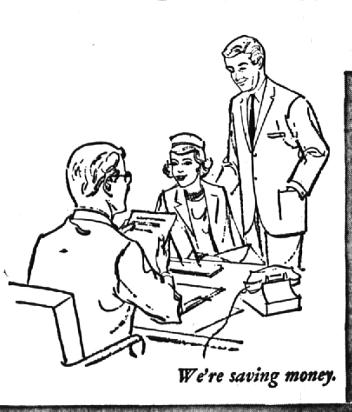
