Southfield High School is located at 10 Mile and Lahser roads, Southfield.

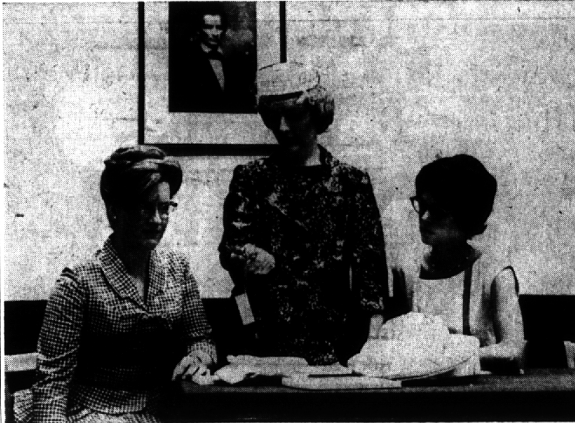
**Pratt Art Alumni Show Their Work At Jacobson's**

**BRIDGE in BIRMINGHAM**

We all enjoy the great imagination of the declarer when he or she gains an extra trick, but how about the imagination and excitement of the good defensive plays? Today's hand displays what can be done by the defense.

Ralph Tyson, whose name appears very regularly in this column as a winner, came up with the winning play in today's hand. This particular hand was defended by many a good player, but Ralph came up with the winning defense.

North and South vulnerable. South is dealer.

**NORTH**  
 ♠ A K J 3  
 ♥ 7 4 2

 ♣ 7

The bidding:  
 South West North East  
 1 ♠ pass 1 ♦ pass  
 2 NT pass 2 NT all pass  
 Opening lead: 6 ♣

The declarer overtook East's queen of hearts with his ace and led the king of diamonds to the second trick.

East could see no advantage to hold up on this trick, so he went up with his ace and now, what to play? His first choice was the ten of hearts, which held this trick, but now should he continue the suit or switch?

After careful deliberation, Ralph decided to play the eight of clubs. He knew that if he continued the hearts, he would be squeezed when he would have to discard some things on the fourth heart and then three more discards on the diamonds. But to play the eight of

clubs, he would force the declarer to guess at this point. As it turned out, South went up with the ace of clubs and then could only take eight tricks for down one.
