**Speaker Will Discuss Dairy Tour to Russia**  
 George D. Scott of Bloomfield Hills will be guest speaker at the national dairy industry meeting at the School of Government meeting at 1:30 p.m. Wednesday at the Veterans Memorial Building, Detroit. His topic is "Highlights of a U.S. Dairy Delegation to Russia."  
 Scott, vice president of the Ex-Cello Corp. Packaging Equipment Group, was one of five men prominent in the U.S. Dairy industry to visit Russia recently as part of a two-way exchange arranged by the Dairy Society International at the request of the U.S. State Department.  
 AS HEAD OF the packaging group and in his capacity as the national dairy industry's president, chairman of June Dairy Month 1963, he has traveled extensively throughout the world. He has also served on committees and as a member of the board of directors of the National Dairy Council, Chicago, and the Dairy Society International, Washington, D. C. His promotion efforts have earned him a number of international awards including an Oscar from the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences for the documentary film Project Hope.

**St. Regis Scouts Set Camp-out**  
 At the last meeting of Boy Scout Troop 1066 at St. Regis School Friday, was made of a camp-out at Waterloo recreation grounds, Chelsea, the weekend of Nov. 22.

**Fiscal Report Presented in Beverly Hills**  
 BEVERLY HILLS—"Budget on target" was Councilman Chester Guilmet's phrase to sum up a report of the auditors on the village's fiscal condition.  
 Guilmet, chairman of the finance commission, directed the attention of the council to the report. An estimated \$58,000 surplus in the accounts came out to an actual \$56,977.81.  
 "The gain in our accounts is due in great part to careful investing by Village Treasurer Robert J. Lakatos," Guilmet said. He pointed out that interest from money in various funds invested in bonds came to \$18,276.78.  
 THIS WAS MADE up of interest of \$2,558 from the general fund; \$1039.99 from the construction fund; \$2940.38 from the road fund; \$9486.04 from the county fund; \$1,552.17 from the trunkline fund.  
 Painting the village office and printing and mailing of the road program were the only major unforeseen expenses, according to Guilmet.  
 He thanked Lakatos and commission members Jim Macree and Edward M. Shurtlett for their cooperation.

**Books Arrive In Ethiopia**  
 "Books for Ethiopia," project in the Birmingham area during the last eight months, has resulted in approximately 3,970 pounds of books being sent to Direawa, Ethiopia.  
 Most of these have already been received and put into use there in the new high school library or in high school and grade school classes.  
 IN ADDITION, 3,175 pounds, mostly duplicates of books sent to Direawa, were given to the Oakland and Birmingham branches of the AAUW for their annual book sales.  
 To send the almost two tons of books to Ethiopia, \$569.19 was donated by many organizations and individuals. Most of this was spent on postage and wrapping supplies. The remaining money purchased some 60 additional high school library books and three wall maps.  
 In order to ship at the most economical rate, the books had to be wrapped in packages of 11 pounds or less. Many people spent long hours wrapping the nearly 400 packages required.
