## City Hears Report from East Detroit

A report from East Detroit that it was withdrawing from the Michigan Municipal League drew little comment from Birmingham city commissioners Monday night. East Detroit is withdrawing from the League because of its stand on Gov. George Romney's fiscal reform program. The League has supported the program.

Any form of taxation on non-residents has been strongly opposed by East Detroit. A MOTION BY Commissioner David F. Breck that the administration prepare a report as to how the tax program will affect Birmingham was rejected by the commission. Commissioner Charles A. Renfrew said he did not think the staff was in a position to make a judgment on the program.

The majority of the commission felt the program was an individual matter rather than a city-wide position.

## Roving Days Are Over for County Dogs

No longer can an Oakland County dog be his own master, even temporarily, for a light-spirited romp. Their masters, dog owners who let pets run at large, will receive violation tickets from county dog wardens, according to Dr. Frank E. Bates, director of the Animal Welfare Division.

THE MISCELLANEOUS Committee of the Oakland County Board of Supervisors last week recommended stricter enforcement of the dog laws. Tickets will be issued for failure to obtain a dog license, as well as for allowing dogs-about-town. Maximum penalty faced by owners is a \$100 fine plus court costs and 90 days in jail.

## Former Resident Of Birmingham Dies

Ralph Hoofnagle, 69, a resident of Birmingham for 25 years before moving to Concord, Mich., died suddenly Wednesday of a heart attack in William Beaumont Hospital. A semi-retired manufacturer's representative, Mr. Hoofnagle was a life-time member of the Lions Club of Concord.

He is survived by his wife, Ella; a daughter, Mrs. Sam Burns of Birmingham; a son, Willard of Bloomfield Hills; a brother, Clarence, of Farmington and five grandchildren. Funeral services will take place Saturday at 1 p.m. in the Manley Bailey Funeral Home, with burial in Roseland Park Cemetery.

## City to Get New Siren For Air Raids

The City is going to purchase a new siren to cover the downtown Birmingham area. City commissioners authorized the purchase from civil defense funds Monday night.

John F. Saeffe, administrative aide in charge of civil defense, said the present siren on top of the municipal building is not in operating order.

He said the siren, which is an old fire siren in service for almost 20 years, has been repaired twice in recent years at a cost of \$100 each time. It is again in need of repair, he said.

A NEW siren for the downtown area was sought because the other sirens at the Chestnut and Adams fire stations are not strong enough to be heard in that area.

The cost of the new siren will be about \$600, Saeffe said, with the Federal Government paying one-half of the purchase price.

Trooper William Stark of the Pontiac State Police Post found the children sleeping under a mattress in a doll house. Police from the sheriff's, West Bloomfield, Sylvan Lake and Orchard Lake departments assisted in the hunt.
