Bishop Reed is a native of Michigan and a graduate of Albion College, Garrett Theological Seminary and Northwestern University. He has preached in Michigan for 31 years and served as bishop of the Detroit area — which includes the entire state of Michigan — and approximately 1,000 churches — for 15 years.

Also, he has served as president of the Detroit Council of Churches, Michigan Council of Churches, Michigan district governor of Kiwanis International, and president of the Council of Bishops of the Methodist Church, 1962-63.

Bombed Alabama Church Receives Aid from B'ham

When the church school of the 16th Street Baptist Church in Birmingham, Ala., was bombed on Sabbath, Sept. 15, 1963, and four little girls tragically lost their lives, the children and teachers of the church school of First Presbyterian Church, Birmingham, Mich., felt something should be done.

On Sept. 19, the following telegram was sent by the Rev. W. Glen Harris, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, to the Rev. John Cross, pastor of the 16th Street Baptist Church:

"The hearts of our congregation of 4,000 members go out to your congregation in this time of tragedy and suffering. Our session, in emergency meeting Sunday, will consider means of extending our hands as well as our hearts, and you will hear further from us. The first seven verses of Second Corinthians express our message to you. May God continue to bless you."

AT A SPECIAL Meeting on Sabbath, Sept. 22, the session received that a special offering be requested from the entire congregation and church school on World Wide Communion Sunday, Oct. 6, for the purpose of helping to rebuild the bombed church school.

Mrs. Nelson A. Miles, treasurer of general missions of the First Presbyterian Church, delivered a check of \$1,670 to Dr. Harris. The offering has been forwarded to Rev. Cross.

Missionary Will Talk to Youth Group

Mr. Harvey Lee Polley, American Baptist missionary to the Republic of Congo, will speak to the Senior High Youth Fellowship at 6:30 p.m. Sunday at the First Baptist Church of Birmingham.

John Koll, a student at Wayne State from the Republic of Congo, will join Mr. Polley in discussing the problem of prejudice from a world point of view. The youth group has been discussing this issue for a series of Sundays.

Mr. Polley has just completed his first term of service in the Congo where for the last two years he has taught science and mathematics at Ecole de Pasteurs de Instituteurs in Kinshasa.



Appointed by the American Baptist Foreign Mission Society in June, 1958, he and his family sailed for Belgium the following year for a year of study before going on to the Congo.

A NATIVE OF Spokane, Wash., Mr. Polley earned his bachelor of arts degree at Whitworth College, located in Spokane. He also holds a master of education degree from Central Washington College of Education in Ellensburg.

Additional courses were taken at Berkeley Baptist Divinity School in Berkeley, Calif., after his appointment.

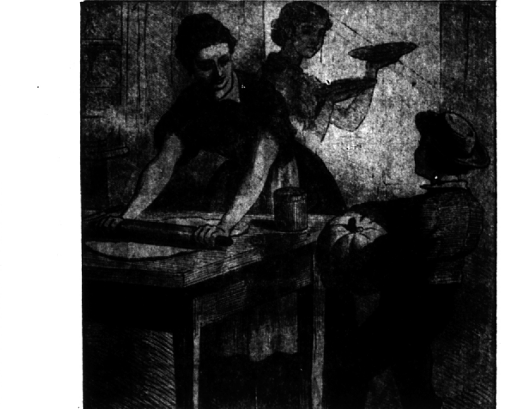
Mr. Polley is married to the former Miss Corinne Weber, also of Spokane. They have three children. He is a member of Central Baptist Church in Quincy, Wash.
