native of Ohio, she served for five years, 1954-59, as state league president for her new home state of Indiana where her husband is a member of the faculty of Indiana University.

In 1955 she was a member of the Indiana White House Conference Committee, a gubernatorial appointment. As national first vice president of the League for the 1962-64 term, she effectively back-stops the work of Mrs. Rose Phillips, national president, who was a member of the National Suburban Homemaker of the Year Award judging panel in 1962.

A DAILY CHICAGO radio program is titled, "Call Dr. Kehm." It stars not a hirsute and handsome interne but a gentle-faced woman whose compassion for the human race is plainly marked on her features.

As director of the Association for Family Living, as lecturer, author and counselor, Dr. Freda S. Kehm is practically concerned with most of the ills that flesh, mind and emotions are heir to. On her radio show four telephone lines bring those troubles directly to her while the show is on the air. The "doctor" of course refers not to an M.D. but to her Ph.D. in sociology from Northwestern University, but Dr. Kehm's approach to sociology is far from an academic one only. The list of her activities, past and present, would fill a newspaper column.

Beginning in undergraduate days with a membership in Phi Beta Kappa, Dr. Kehm's brilliant career includes serving as delegate to three White House Conferences. She has been chairman of Mental Health of the Illinois Congress of

Parents and Teachers, writes a feature on marriage and the family for a Chicago newspaper, authored numerous articles and pamphlets for textbook publishers and other educational outlets.

She has even conquered the traditional barrier of her sex to achieve a listing in "Who's Who Among Men of Science."

DR. KEHM SEEMS to be that rare individual, a born social worker. Doubtless her mature and unbiased outlook is the result of experience, but the inner strength, the compassion, the dedication must have been congenital.

The old saw, "If you want something done, ask the busiest person you know," applies in Dr. Kehm's case. With all of her responsibilities, she immediately and graciously accepted the invitation of the Suburban Press Foundation to serve as one of the national judges to select the "National Suburban Homemaker of the Year" for 1963.

Dr. Kehm's clear and calm judgment, her ability to cut away nonessentials and get to the matter at hand, will prove of immense value to her fellow judges during the judging session to be held Nov. 20 in Chicago.

To select one woman from among the outstanding suburban homemakers across the nation will be a difficult task. Dr. Kehm has proved, however, that she flourishes under difficult tasks. The woman who receives Freda Kehm's vote as "National Suburban Homemaker of the Year" can know, indeed, that she has received a well considered accolade.
