

Zoning Change Approved by Commission

Birmingham city commissioners Monday night approved a request to rezone a lot at 711 W. Maple from single-family (R-1) to single-family (R-2).

The commission acted upon a recommendation from the planning board to approve the rezoning. An earlier request to rezone the property to two-family (R-4) had been denied.

The planning board cited two reasons for recommending the rezoning. Because of the size and shape of the lot, it would have been difficult to develop it with the 9,000-sq-ft minimum required in the R-1 classification. An R-2 lot requires only 6,000 square feet for development.

City Planner William R. Brownfield said the R-2 classification would be more in keeping with the surrounding zoning in the area. The property to the east, he said, is zoned two-family (R-4) and the property on the west is single-family (R-1).
