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## Contractors, 'Council Discuss 'No Paving'

BEVERLY HILLS—Three local contractors who described themselves as "force competitors" joined forces Monday to hit the courts for a suspension or rescinding of the ruling that no concrete could be poured in the village after Nov. 1. The council denied the rescinding but will allow paving under certain conditions. Lester Taubman, whose firm is Lahser, south of 14 Mile Road; William J. Pulte, building Georgetown Green at 13 Mile Road and Lahser; and Walter Denison representing Andrews and Briggs, builders of Nottingham Forest No. 5, in the Lahser and 14 Mile Road area, teamed up to request the change in the ruling.

TAUBMAN, spokesman for the group, told the council that since the ruling had gone into effect Oct. 14, they were not prepared for it, and much of the work already completed would be lost if the pouring of the concrete is not finished now. Councilman Claude A. Shephard told the men that the village would not be responsible for the roads if the concrete did not reach adequate hardness due to freezing weather. "I as a taxpayer object to taking a gamble on your project on which you make a profit," Shephard said.

THE COUNCIL denied the request for rescinding the ruling, but will allow the contractors to pave after the Nov. 1 deadline providing they withhold 10 per cent of the total paving contract in escrow until the concrete question reaches the ultimate strength of 3,500 pounds per square inch. The tests must be verified by Johnson and Anderson on the basis of in-place core tests, and if the concrete has not reached the proper hardness by June 1, the village can use any part of the 10 per cent holdback to repair the roads.

He further stipulated that no trucks in excess of three-quarter tons be allowed on the road until such time as the roads reach desired hardness. IN OTHER business, Pulte, was permitted to omit the construction of 406 feet of sidewalk on Georgetown Green and was returned the escrow of \$1,000 which he had put up. A study will be made by Walter Koubla, road commissioner, on the problem of bridging the Evans Drain for a sidewalk in front of Huntley Subdivision on 13 Mile Road.

## Accused Rapist Must Appear in Circuit Court

Louis Milton, Jr., of Pontiac has been bound over to Oakland County Circuit Court where he will face charges of raping a 31-year-old mother of two. Milton, 31, stood mute at an arraignment Tuesday before Judge Stanton G. Henderson. Bond was continued at \$50,000 and Milton was remanded to Oakland County Jail. No date was set for trial.

MILTON IS accused of criminally assaulting the 31-year-old Pontiac woman on Sept. 14. He also is accused of raping a 51-year-old Pontiac woman in her basement Sept. 29 and a 19-year-old Waterford woman in Bloomfield Township April 13.

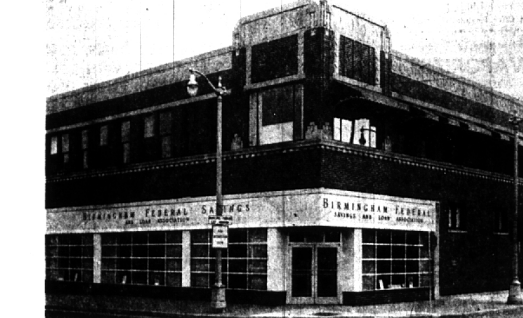
