Prof. Maurice Waters of Wayne State University spoke on the important changes which have taken place in the United Nations since 1960.

The offering received on World Community Day is used for an in-service training program for church women from this country and from some of the newly-independent countries.

Other work that receives assistance from the offering is the continuing support of the refugee work of the World Council of Churches, scholarships for leadership training for women from the developing countries and continuation of the United Church Women's program of international education and action.
