**AAUW Plans To Hear Talk On Europe**

"What kind of role will a new European superpower play in the world?" is the type of question that Carlos E. Toro, manager, World Trade Department, Greater Detroit Board of Commerce, will answer when he speaks to the American Association of University Women Wednesday at The Community House, Birmingham.

Today's Europe—Ferment Toward Unity" is the topic Mr. Toro has chosen to discuss at the 12:30 p.m. luncheon meeting.

BEFORE MR. Toro came to Detroit he was with the National Chamber of Commerce in Washington, where he was a member of the staff of the Foreign Commerce Department doing research work in international affairs and economics.

Prior to his work at the U. S. Chamber of Commerce he worked in a research capacity on the personal staff of a senator and for a subcommittee of the interior and insular affairs committee in the Senate.

Mr. Toro spent several years in school in Germany. He did his undergraduate work at the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia and his graduate work at the School of International Studies in Washington, now a graduate division of Johns Hopkins University.

SINCE COMING TO Detroit, Mr. Toro has done extensive traveling in Europe, Africa, South Asia and the Far East and has circumnavigated the globe three times. He is an active member of a number of organizations devoted to international affairs and economics.

**Dolls Preview Christmas for Alumnae Club**

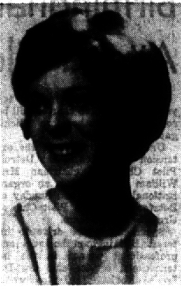

**Parents Sponsor Card Party as Groves' Benefit**

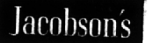

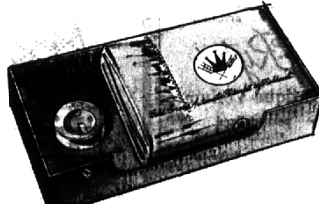

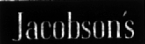
