Llewellyn Wesley Smead retired in 1957 at the age of fifty-five following thirty-six years of employment with Ford Motor Co. He was general sales manager for the Ford Division. Since then, clubs, golf and charitable work have kept him furiously busy.

He serves as church trustee, hospital trustee, United Fund worker and country club director; holds memberships in American, western, southern and Michigan Senior Golf Associations, and the 200 club, an association of "200 gentleman senior golfers."

In addition to competing in the golf tournaments of his senior associations, he plays annually in the World Seniors Golf Tournament at Broadmoor, Colorado Springs, and in the North-South Seniors Tournament at Pinehurst. He has played on three international American senior teams and won 14 out of 15 matches staged in Belgium, Deauville, France and Bermuda.

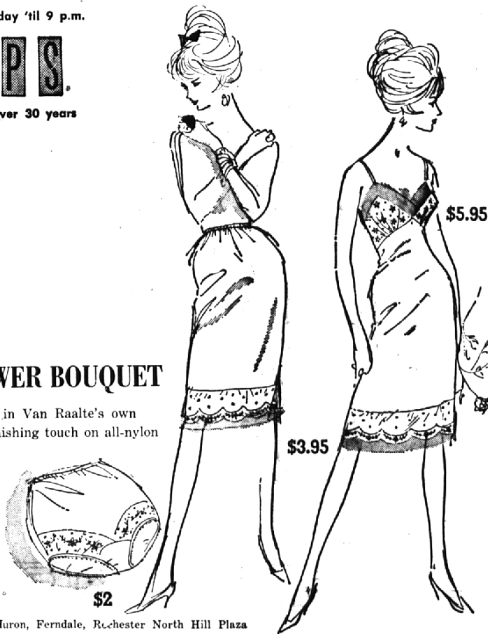
