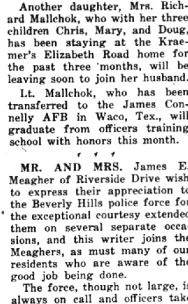
Co-chairmen of the affair are Miss Rosemary McMillan and Mrs. Henry Blackwell.
