Three-Pronged Program Is Underway

The Optimist Club of Southfield plans a three-pronged program for 1955-56. It will sponsor a multi-program of events designed to recognize, honor and help the youth of the community.

Mayor James Clarkson will proclaim the week of Nov. 10, as "Youth Appreciation Week," in conjunction with the International Optimist Organization.

The usual "Youth In Government" program will take place on Tuesday, Nov. 12. The activities will commence with a school-wide assembly in the Southfield High School auditorium at 10 a.m. At this time, all students elected and the appointed officials will be recognized and keys to the city will be presented.

CITY OFFICIALS will be introduced along with school officials and members of the Optimist Club. The student assembly will be followed by a lunch prepared by the homemaking department of the high school.

The Optimist Club of Southfield initiated this program some years ago in cooperation with the Southfield High School staff and the City of Southfield to recognize and honor the youth of the community who quietly and diligently behave as they should.

The program this year will be supplemented with a firearms safety training program. It will be conducted on Nov. 6 and 13.

The firearms program will be sponsored by the Michigan State Conservation Department and the Optimist Club of Southfield. Its purpose is to develop safety techniques and will have the assistance and backing of the Michigan State Police, the Southfield Police Department, the National Rifle Association and the Southfield Public Schools.

TWO SESSIONS, two hours each, of instruction and demonstration will be conducted by John Griffin, of the Michigan State Conservation Department and the National Rifle Association.

All youths from 12 to 17 inclusive, who reside in the Southfield School district or the City of Southfield are eligible. Classes will take place at the Southfield High School at 7 p.m. in the gym.

Those passing the course will receive a certificate, which is expected to be a requirement for receiving a hunting license in 1964. Adults are also invited to participate in this program.

The meeting will be held in Union Lake.

The program will be a movie of the 1962 World Series with the New York Yankees versus the San Francisco Giants.

There also will be a discussion of the Optimist Club Treasure Hunt, which will be Saturday, Nov. 8.
