

Roseville Halts Seaholm's Title Bid

So close yet so far away. Seaholm, riding the top of the Eastern Michigan League title race for weeks, invaded Roseville with just one victory needed for the crown and returned with nothing but a faint hope for glory.

The Maples found the Wildcats to be very rude hosts, indeed, and not only were victims of a 13-12 upset, but saw their title chances crushed with the legs.

Seaholm, with a 5-1-1 record, now can only wait and hope that Hazel Park, the team that tied them at 7-7, can provide a miracle by knocking off title-bound Ferndale this week.

FERNDALE, who lost to Seaholm earlier, now stands at 5-1 and needs only the win over Hazel Park to give them their fourth EML crown in the last five years.

The Eagles, nipped Royal Oak Kimball, 19-14, Friday to move into

the lead that Seaholm held for so long.

Area Skiers To Participate In Ski Show

Birmingham area skiers will be competing in Detroit's first ski jumping tournament at Farwell Field Saturday and Sunday.

The tournament, held in connection with the 1964 Detroit Ski Fair, will begin at 1 p.m. Saturday and will last for three hours.

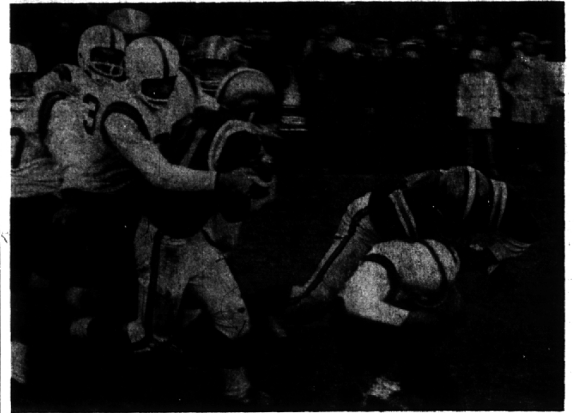
Skiers will leap from a specially constructed 128-foot high and 350-foot long steel scaffold. Jumps will be made off a newly-developed plastic material onto shaved ice.

THE SKI PAIR, held in the Light Guard Armory, 4400 E. Eight Mile, adjacent to the jumping site, will be held Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

The Fair will feature a downhill skiing demonstration on an "indoor-covered" 90-foot-long, 15-foot-high "miniature mountain" by Stein Eriksen, former Norwegian Olympic champion.

Films, exhibits and fashion shows will present the most comprehensive information available on ski lodges, equipment and fashions.

GPUS RETAINS CUP

Yellowjackets Blanked, 20-0

Country Day lost the battle for the cup without a name Saturday as Grosse Pointe University School dumped the Yellowjackets, 20-0.

The cup, symbolic of the rivalry between the two schools, was donated by a GPUS alum back in 1935 when the East Side school was then known as Detroit University School.

Since that time GPUS has won the trophy 15 times and Detroit Country Day, eight. The Yellowjackets haven't seen the cup since 1960.

ALTHOUGH the score doesn't indicate it, the game was a tight,

close affair. In fact, it boiled down to a matter of inches.

After GPUS tallied in the first quarter to lead at the half, 6-0, the game settled down to a defensive contest. Grosse Pointe dominated the first half, Country Day the second.

In the third quarter, the Yellowjackets finally got going. They drove to the GPUS 12-yard line where they failed to make a badly-needed first down by one inch.

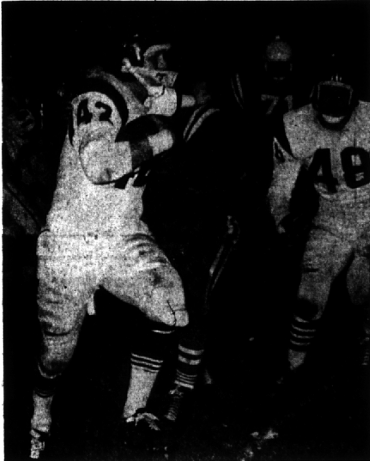
Later in the period, another Country Day drive fell short by inches, deep in GPUS territory. The two near misses resulted in

Entering the Junior events will be Alison Cram, 17, a co-champ in the Professional Horseman's Association Dressage Finals in 1961, and winner of the event last year. It will be her fifth time at the Garden.

ALSO RETURNING to New York will be Donna Lee Brown, 17, Chris Jones, 16, Peter Foley, 16, and Robert M. Lambert, Jr., 16.

Miss Cram will enter the Junior Hunter Division and the Equitation finals for the Macley Trophy. She will also compete in the American Horse Show Association's Medal Class. She is a member of the Bloomfield Open Hunt.

Riders must qualify during the year within their zones in equitation competition in order to be eligible for the Equitation finals in New York.

Lambert and Foley will enter the Equitation finals and Lambert will also compete in the Regular Hunter Working Division.

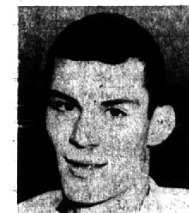

2ND CROWN IN 10 YEARS

Maple Harriers Capture State Cross-Country Finals

Hill the conquering Maples! Seaholm's powerful cross-country squad returned from Ypsilanti Saturday with the state high school championship, quite a successful way to end the season.

Coch Kermit Ambrose called it "a tremendous performance." "I believe that this 1963 team is the best that I have ever coached," he said.

Ambrose had good reason to believe so. Seaholm won the state finals with just 41 points, the lowest winning total in the 10 years Ambrose has coached cross-country, and possibly the lowest total of all time.

IT WAS THE second state championship for the Maples in

the last 10 years, the first one coming in 1959. Seaholm won that one with 73 points. The best previous total was 48 by Detroit Redford in 1961, just to give you an idea of how good this year's score is.

The Maples, who have finished no lower than seventh during the last 10 years and who own the distinction of being the only school in the entire state to place in the top 10 for each of the last 10 years, had an easy time of it Saturday if you can call running two miles easy.

Seaholm placed 1-2-11-13-14-16-25 to outdistance second-place Grand Rapids Christian with 89 points and third-place Milford with 115.

West Bloomfield Trims B'field in Finale, 35-20

Bloomfield and West Bloomfield met in the last game of the season for both teams Friday just like last year, but the importance and result of the game was much different.

Last year, the two arch-rivals were tied for the Wayne-Oakland lead and the game meant every-

thing to both schools.

The final score was 19-19 and they shared the title for the year. Friday, a lot had changed. The Lakers had been knocked out of a three-way tie the previous week by Clarkston and had to be content with second place.

THE BARONS had dropped near the bottom of the standings with a 1-5 conference mark, a far cry from last season's record.

West Bloomfield won the game, 35-20, and the game produced two fine performances by a couple of departing seniors, Dan Greig and Jay Shimmick.

Greig, the Lakers' highly-touted quarterback, scored three touchdowns on runs of 74, two and seven yards. He also harassed the Baron pass defense, completing 11 of 12 tosses for 99 yards.

NOT TO BE outdone, Baron quarterback Jay Shimmick broke loose for three TD's of his own. He scored on dashes of 52, 34 and 22 yards.

The victory left West Bloomfield with a 5-2 record, one-half game behind Northville and Clarkston, who tied for the title. Bloomfield finished with a 1-6 league mark.

Greig ran for an extra point and threw three passes for PAT's. John Nemyer and Tim Ruen scored the Lakers' other two touchdowns.

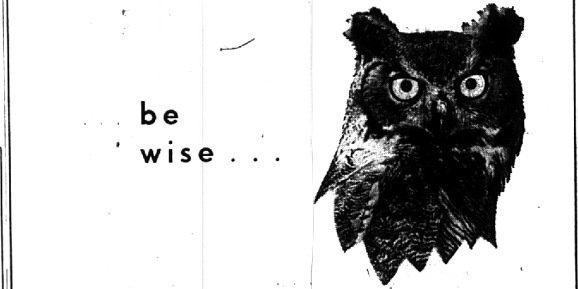
Pete Vidor and Jamie Miller accounted for Bloomfield's two extra points to close out the scoring.
