Bob Richards of Bloomfield Hills won the individual Class A crown, setting a new record of 9:41. The victory completed a perfect season for the Maples. They won all 10 dual meets, captured the All-Oakland County run, brought back the Eastern Michigan League title, won the EML dual meet championships, ran off with the state regatta and put the cap on the year with the state finals.

DOUBTLESS, this extraordinary record is a result of the fine caliber of runner Seaholm has been blessed with. However, the school's record is a tribute to Ambrose. The results speak for themselves.

Oso's 1951 Seaholm has won two state titles, finished 2nd twice, 5th twice, 6th three times and 7th once. The Maples have been regional champs seven times and finished 2nd the other three years. They have won nine EML meets and seven EML dual meet crowns, finishing no lower than 2nd, and three out of four Oakland County runs.

Seaholm has won the Hastings and the Greyhound Invitational the only times they entered them, and they have completed a 70-11 dual meet record with 20 championships under Ambrose.

Two Birmingham men are among 10 local executives who have organized the Fairgrounds Riding School at the Michigan State Fair Grounds.

Elmer A. Skowbo, 1047 Top View, and George S. Dixon, 6223 Dakota Circle, are vice-president and secretary of the Riding School, respectively. Patterned after the English riding schools which have taught fine horsemanship in England for centuries, Fairgrounds is believed to be the first of its kind in the mid-west open to the public.

LOCATED in the Horse Barn, the school has use of the indoor riding ring with heated observation room, outdoor ring, dirt track, field and grandstand.

Local classes will range from beginners through advanced horsemanship with dressage. School hours are from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Tuesday through Friday; Saturday and Sunday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.; closed on Mondays.

Special arrangements are made for individual series instructions, groups, and riders aiming at specialization in specific phases of horsemanship. Complete information may be obtained at the school or by phoning LI 5-2251.

FAIRGROUNDS also has limited provisions for stabling privately-owned horses. Special training for these horses is available.
