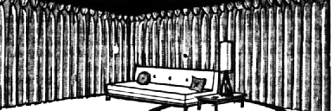

Community Support Urged For Delinquency Prevention

A plea to a group of 50 civic leaders including those from the Birmingham area to join a "national citizens movement" was made in Detroit Monday by two officials of the National Society for the Prevention of Juvenile Delinquency.

Charlotte Ford, youth activities director, and John R. Winter, executive director, asked the group to submit a formal application for a state charter of the national society. They were also asked to close ranks with persons "from all walks of life and from every profession."

Miss Ford, daughter of Henry Ford II, detailed a report of a pilot project for needy, deserving girls, ages 12-17, that had been the result of "imaginative planning by the national society. The project, called the Health & Grooming Clinic, could have a significant impact on community life, Miss Ford stated.

"I AM SINCERELY convinced that if more girls were positively influenced by such programs, a more wholesome atmosphere would prevail and pervade a community or neighborhood.

She then asked the audience to help make a Health & Grooming clinic a reality in the Detroit area. She said the prospect of such a school was "excellent" and that it would probably start by the end of the year.

Miss Ford then outlined for the luncheon guests that were brought together by Mrs. William A. Compton of Birmingham about the existing organizational needs of her Youth Activities Division. She would for thoughtful leadership at the community level and stated that the only requirement was that individuals have "an active interest in youth."

MANY OF THE guests at the meeting were members of the Citizens Council of Youth Physical Fitness of Birmingham. Mrs. Compton is the chairman of the organization that was founded last year.

Said Miss Ford, "Although we have had innumerable inquiries into our program and pledges of support, we are looking to such groups as Mrs. Compton's Citizens Council for Youth Physical Fitness, the Junior League and the dedicated, but lesser known, groups and agencies that could well be mobilized to carry out our programs."

present law enforcement." Whitehead said.

"ONE SUGGESTION was to reduce the legal age for the purchase of cigarettes and alcoholic beverages to 18.

"This was not, however, acted upon by the council, but was only a part of discussion during the meeting," he said.

"Clearly, the council and its members must play a vital, leading and, at times, controversial role in these problems so that out of discussion will come acceptable solutions.

"These solutions lie with the citizens and their cooperation with law enforcement agencies," he said.

The Parenteen Committee, under the direction of Mrs. Jean Sharrard and Mrs. Helen Henderson, have invited members of the PTA Council to join a round-table discussion on Wednesday, Nov. 20, at 8 p.m. in the Hill Building, to consider with representatives of the police departments in this area methods of supporting enforcement of pertinent laws.



IN NEW YORK, former Detroiters Charlotte Ford, 22, and John R. Winter, 28, checked over plans before arriving for the luncheon Monday in Detroit at which both spoke as representatives of the National Society for the Prevention of Juvenile Delinquency.

Winter, a former Detroitier himself, cited the need for a private effort to contain the growing severity of delinquency. He noted that the youth crime rate doubled in the last 10 years with more than 1,000,000 detected youthful offenders recorded last year.

He said that the Federal Government could not tackle the total job effectively because of the lack of pressure to insure effective legislation.

"UNFORTUNATELY, there will never be sufficient pressure come to bear on any Federal agency to pass any legislation that will cure the problem of delinquency. For it takes a lot of pressure—a buildup of public opinion—to have any positive and significant influence at all on what governmental agencies do.

Both Miss Ford and Winter asked the group to participate in the national society's first fund-raising event in its 10-year history. It is the Youth Manor Hall which will be held at The Plaza in New York Thursday, Nov. 21.

Several weeks ago, the national society made some key appointments of individuals in the state. They include Allan Werthmann, special events director and Andrew A. Lujan, state membership chairman, both of the Birmingham-Bloomfield area.
