all the roads in Franklin hard-surfaced. The committee was then authorized to take the next steps and secure all the legal and financial assistance it could to properly frame such a question for the ballot.

Among the important considerations are to get the Michigan State Highway Department to approve the commitment of future road funds and to secure precise costs and mileage of such a program and determine materials.

The COMMITTEE recommendation reiterates opinions of previous councils, state authorities,

planning commissions and road commissioners, that hard surfacing is the only economical solution to excessive maintenance costs. It suggests that public sentiment and resistance to "hard-surfacing" as such may be more responsive to "stabilizing treatments" like those used on Brandingham and on portions of Wellington and Scenic roads.

The committee contends that all of the roads should be stabilized at one time while they are at the peak of condition and paid for over a five-year period. This is not expected to exceed the present eight-mile limitation and could, they said, be done, at one time, for less mileage.

Among other matters considered Monday night were unresolved details of the court injunction against Daniel Lublin and the dedication of Bruce Lane as a village road.

IT WAS agreed that Bruce Lane property owners would be advised that if they waive the right to build the road upon village acceptance of the dedication, the village will proceed with the work and a special assessment district will be created to cover the costs not covered by the injunction. A public hearing is expected in January.

Kenneth Bailey was introduced as the new chairman of the planning commission. Other new officers are Don Tyler, vice-chairman, and Mrs. Stephen Gidley, secretary.

Bailey was requested to give special attention to proposed zoning changes in surrounding communities like Bloomfield and West Bloomfield along 14 Mile Road which would have a direct effect on Franklin's peripheral neighborhoods.
