While in Chicago-in addition to wining and dining, attending teas, luncheons,

dinners and the theater Mary will meet her counter-parts from suburban communities all over the country
—top homemakers all.

On Thursday, Nov. 21, while the National Suburban Homemakers Conference is in session, each local winner will be called out of the session, one at a time, for a brief personal interview with the national judges. At the conclusion of these interviews, the judges will select the na-tional winner and three runners-up.

MARY EKBERG IS a de-

mother of three children -Jan, 15, Jim, 11, and Jo Ann, 5—and wife to husband Walt who loves everything about her including "the antiques she sometimes drags home, which at first sight appear to be a real mess!

A visit in Mary's home, however, proves she can find ways of making collector's items fit artistically into the decor. The interior of her house is traditional-done in soft blues, purples and green
