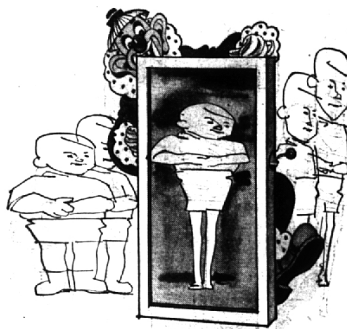
ental art designs. She wore a kimono as she presented her lecture.

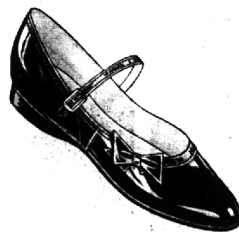
