

Beaumont Hospital Holds Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of William Beaumont Hospital Corp. was held Oct. 28. The corporation consists of 30 members, 20 of whom are elected annually to the board of trustees.

The present trustees were re-elected for the coming year. Irving B. Babcock, president, was elevated to the newly-created position of chairman of the board. Arthur F. Bassett of Bassett, Slavens and Associates, Royal Oak was elected president and became the chief executive officer of the board.

Lawrence S. King of Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone, Detroit attorneys, was re-elected executive vice president.

THOMAS E. Wilson, general manufacturing manager of the

GMC Truck & Coach Division, Pontiac; William D. Dowsey of Bloomfield Hills; and Franklin Fricke of the Research Laboratories of Ethyl Corp., Farmdale, were re-elected to the board.

Also elected vice presidents were Oakland County Circuit Judge James S. Thorburn; Walter Gehring, chairman of the board of First Federal Savings and Loan, Detroit; and Theron VanDusen of Bloomfield Hills.

John P. Marts, a Detroit attorney, was re-elected secretary, and John K. Stevenson of McKenney-Stevenson, Birmingham, was elected treasurer. All officers were elected for a term of one year.

One new member was elected to the corporation of 30, John E. Poole of Poole, Warren, Little and Gordon, Detroit attorneys.

THE CORPORATE members based on a stated report by Norman D. Scarney, MD, chief of staff at the hospital, in which he discussed plans of the medical staff for the expansion of the hospital services and the development of a medical office building.

Dr. Scarney advised the board that in the last year more than 10,000 patients were admitted to the hospital and about 30,000 were treated in the hospital's emergency ward.

Oswin E. Pinkerman, director of the hospital, reviewed the hospital's current expansion program in his annual report and advised the members that it is expected all expansion work will be complete by May, 1965. When expansion is complete, the hospital will have 711 beds and greatly expanded out-

patient and diagnostic services.

The hospital's current construction program is being undertaken at a cost in excess of 9,000,000 and is in part supported by a grant of \$1,700,000 from the Metropolitan Detroit Building Fund and by a grant from the Federal Government through the Hill-Burton Act, of \$1,125,000.

County Receives Quarterly Share Of Highway Funds

The State Highway Department has started distributing third-quarter Motor Vehicle Highway Fund collections to Michigan counties and incorporated cities and villages.

State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackin said net receipts of the Highway Fund during July, August and September of 1963 amounted to \$48,239,244, an increase of \$1,798,292, or 3.7 per cent, compared to the same period of 1962.

Oakland County's share totaled \$972,788 while Birmingham received \$35,502.
