Two Seaholm Girls Vie for Scholarships

Betsy Griffith and Kathy Kennedy have been chosen by the screening committee to compete from Seaholm High School for the American Field Service Student Exchange Program.

The applications of these girls have been sent to AFS International Scholarship headquarters in New York. It is here the final decision is made.

The purpose of AFS is to send highly-selected U. S. teen-agers overseas to further their understanding of another country and also to increase understanding of the U. S. in other lands.

At Seaholm these students were chosen from juniors who applied in October. Those competing answered forms and returned them, together with an essay, to Dean of Students Carol Darling.

EACH STUDENT appeared before a screening committee, consisting of six adults and six students, Oct. 10. The applicant file was narrowed to eight.

During that meeting each applicant was questioned on national and local affairs and world problems. The judges had the applicant explain their cooperation, adaptability, maturity, responsibility, fact, tolerance and confidence, while responding to such questions as "Have you ever tried to explain the American educational system?" "Do you think all men are created equal?" "What is the greatest obstacle to world peace?" "How could you analyze this statement?" Ben Franklin's kite has grown into a Telstar."

On Oct. 28 the seven semi-finalists were screened again. The judges concentrated on each applicant's insight, poise and ability to handle unforeseen problems.

Three foreign exchange students, representing Ecuador, Belgium and Australia are currently enrolled at Seaholm.

Commuters Aren't Left Out in Cold

A closed-in bus shelter will be built and installed within the next few weeks in front of Green's Art Store at the corner of Woodward and Daines, Birmingham.

The shelter is being donated by William J. Fuller, a resident of the Birmingham building firm bearing his name. The location is one of the most popular for dropping off and picking up the many domestic who commute daily from Detroit to Birmingham.

Fuller got the idea for the shelter last winter. He says: "Every time I drove by and saw those people standing there waiting for the bus in the rain and snow after a hard day's work it bothered me and so I decided to do something about it."

FIRST I CHECKED with the City and found it couldn't be built on City property so I went to Ed Cooke, owner of Green's, and asked him permission to build it on his shelter on a corner of his property. Ed was all for it."

One of Fuller's staff was put to work to design a building that would be both practical and attractive. The proposed building will be eight feet wide and will be able to accommodate five to six people at one time. It will be constructed of textured plywood and have a cedar shake roof.

Fuller plans to have a bus schedule posted for the commuter's convenience.

Loan Fund Available For Needy Students

The Birmingham Student Loan and Scholarship Fund is available for students who need financial assistance in the pursuit of higher education.

The loan fund is available for students who wish to borrow money to further their education. Loans are secured by a non-interest bearing promissory note, payable when the student's educational plan is completed or discontinued.

If the student desires to defer payments, he may do so at four per cent per year. Loans are limited to \$400 in any one year, or a total of \$1,000.

Applications may be obtained through the counselors at the high schools, or from the association.

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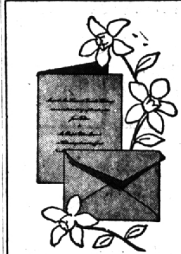
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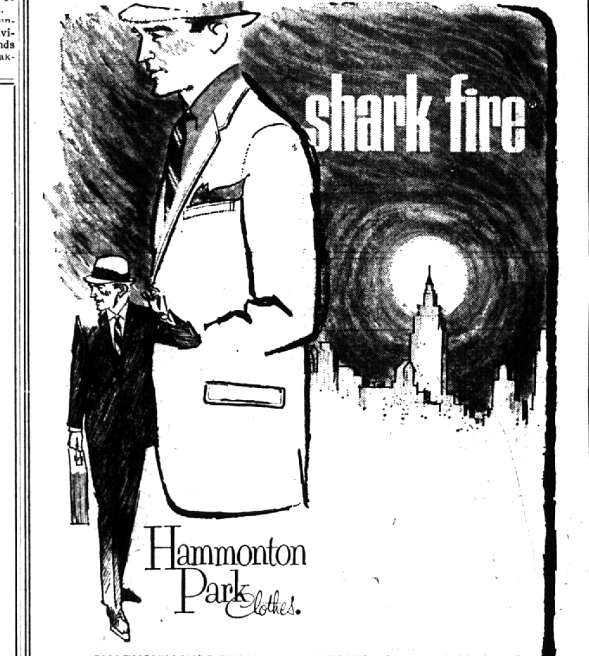
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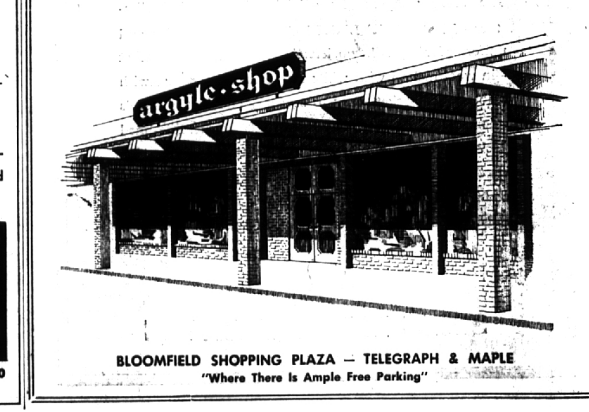


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
