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## Ski School Under Way At Sporthaus

A new and unique ski school is getting the 1963-64 ski season under way early this season. Called a "dry ski school," it is designed primarily to get the beginning skier familiar with the fast rising sport before the first snowfall.

The school is under the direction of Bill Shepler, noted school director of the new Boyne Highlands ski area at Harbor Springs, Michigan.

The course will consist of four indoor sessions, and a final one on the slopes. A small enrollment fee will be charged. Official movies made expressly for teaching will be used throughout the classes.

BEGINNERS WILL learn about equipment, how to use it and the basic fundamentals of ski technique. Walking, turning, snow plow and turns will be stressed. A special afternoon class will be held for children.

Advanced and intermediate classes will also be held for skiers of ability who want to brush-up on their technique. For these skiers, the stem Christie and parallel turns will be covered in detail.

## Hunters

Department field observations point to another good-sized herd this fall. In northern Michigan, deer numbers are comparable with last year when hunters harvested nearly 98,000 whitetails. The southern Lower Peninsula's deer population has increased from an estimated 40,000 last year to an estimated 45,000 to 50,000.

More than a quarter of the deer hunters will be carrying permits for antlerless deer if they do not bag their bucks. Rosecommon, Montmorency and Crawford counties will probably continue to be the most populated counties for hunters.

The Conservation Dept. urged hunters to register their away-from-home addresses at its field or district offices this season as well as stop at checking stations on the way home to allow biologists to examine their deer.

Bear populations shape up about the same as last year when 650 were taken. The poor berry crop and warm weather could postpone the "denning up" period for bears.

## Gun Safety

THE NUMBER and causes of hunting accidents would astound anyone, and they all stem from careless thinking and actions. All this can be avoided.

The woods can only be as safe as the hunter makes them. One careless, drunk hunter endangers the lives of his companions as well as his own. A bottle doesn't belong in the woods.

Neither does a careless hunter. Young boys are interested in their guns. Show them the correct loading and unloading. Impress upon them the killing power of a rifle or shotgun.

There is always room for improvement in safety and a conscious, alert hunter helps his sport as well as himself.

YOUNG hunters, taught correctly, become responsible sportsmen. They learn the real joy of glimpsing a flash of a whitetail in the distance, the cackle of a rooster and the cry of a passing flock of honkers. They come out of the woods and marshes as experienced sportsmen, not as senseless, hunting casualties.

During deer season, heed these common-sense rules of gun safety: (1) Be alert for other hunters; (2) Don't surprise other hunters in the woods; (3) Let your hunting partners know where you'll be and stick to the plan; (4) Don't sit on the opposite side of well-traveled runways; (5) Be sure before you shoot.
